

## CHIEF TIFFANY WINS SHERIFF NOMINATION

**Leads Field by Over 4,000 Votes:  
Simpson Is Defeated; Other  
Primary Results**

In Tuesday's primary election Lester T. Tiffany, chief of police of Lake Forest and formerly chief deputy under former Sheriff Ahlstrom, was nominated for sheriff of Lake county on the Republican ticket by a plurality of about 4,500 votes, according to unofficial returns.

Tiffany rolled up large pluralities in practically all of the lake shore precincts, including those of Deerfield and Shields. The totals in the county, from early figures give Tiffany 11,152; Doolittle, 6,584; Brown, 5,948; Green, 5,222; Ahlstrom, 4,103. Brown during the first hours of counting held second place, but later Doolittle forged ahead of him.

### Simpson Defeated

One of the surprises of the primary in this county was the defeat of T. Arthur Simpson by W. C. Petty of Antioch for superintendent of schools, with two precincts missing. Petty's lead in the county, on unofficial returns, was about 2,000. Simpson had 12,751, and Petty, 14,787.

In the race for county judge, Judge Perry Persons had a margin of about 6,000 votes over Charles E. Jack, early returns showed. Totals were, with two precincts missing: Persons, 15,916; Jack, 10,158.

### Mrs. McCormick Wins

Ruth Hannah McCormick carried the county for the nomination for U. S. senator by over 9,000 votes, the early returns giving her 16,203 against 6,860 for Senator Charles S. Deneen, with two precincts missing. Mrs. McCormick had a huge plurality throughout the state.

For congressman in the Tenth district, States Attorney A. V. Smith gave Congressman Carl Chindblom a close race in this county, the complete returns giving Chindblom 12,871 and Smith 12,751. In the remainder of the district Chindblom yesterday seemed to be running well in advance, the latest report Wednesday night being that in the entire district 407 precincts out of 495 had given Chindblom 39,330 and Smith 28,271. With 88 precincts in Chicago still out, Chindblom supporters believed that these would increase his lead, while Smith's supporters were predicting that Chindblom's lead would be cut considerably, if not overcome.

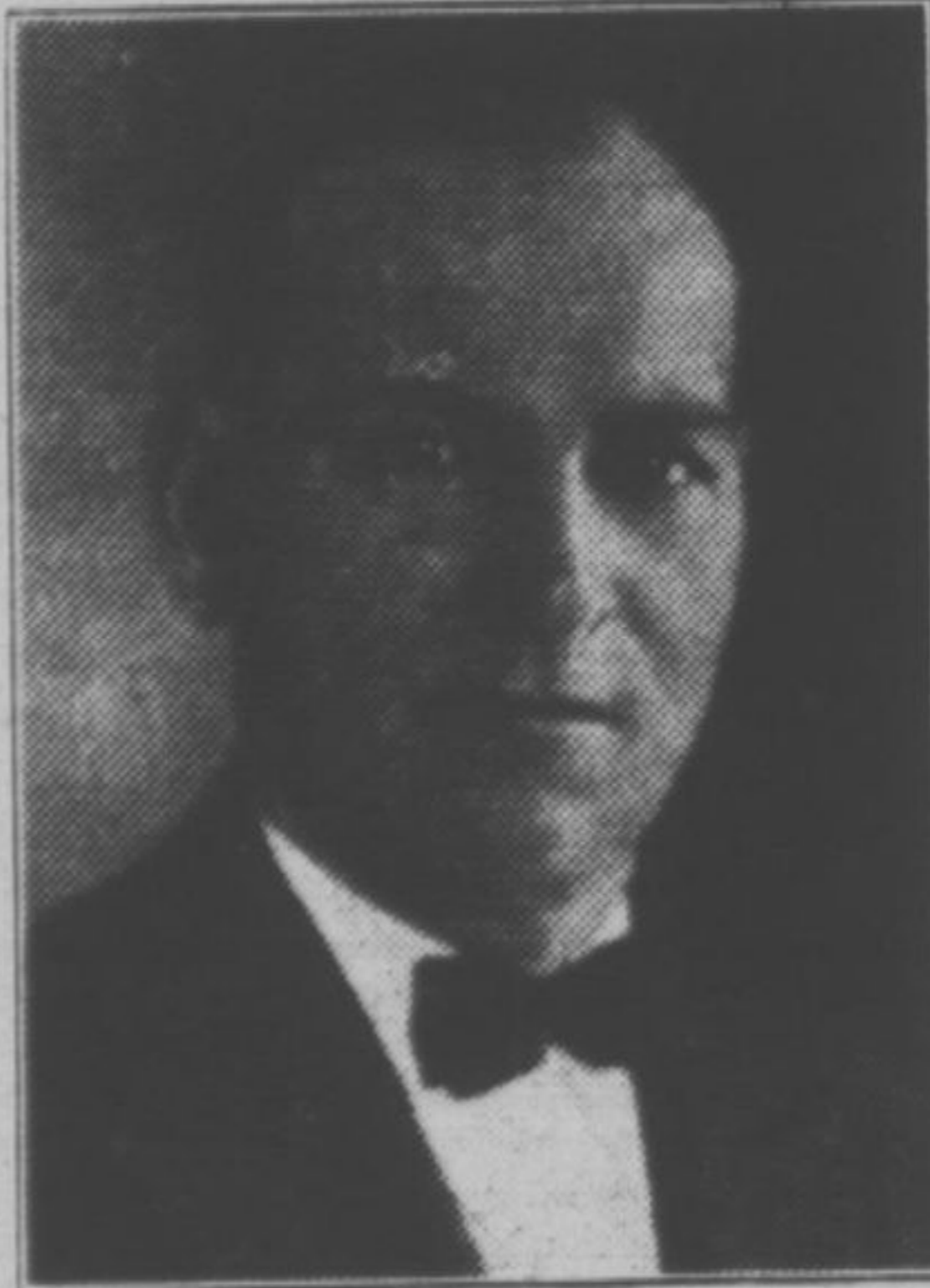

## Mother of Postmaster Schneider Dies Early on Wednesday Morning

Mrs. Anna Schneider, mother of Postmaster Hugo L. Schneider, died at 9:30 o'clock Wednesday morning, at the home of her son, 439 Oakwood avenue. She was in her seventy-ninth year. Mrs. Schneider had been suffering from rheumatism to some extent during the winter but recently was much better and last Friday Mr. Schneider took her to Hubbard Woods to visit friends for a few days. Monday night she became ill and Tuesday morning she was brought home. She gradually became worse. Death was attributed to acute heart trouble.

Mrs. Schneider was the widow of Louis E. Schneider and following his death in Chicago February 9, 1928, she came to Highland Park to live with her son. She was born in Saxony, Germany, February 24, 1852, and came to Chicago in 1893, the World Fair year.

Postmaster Schneider and his sister, Mrs. Henry Hehner of Marion, Wis., are the only children living. Three are dead. There are ten grandchildren.

Mrs. Schneider was a woman of many fine qualities and was held in high esteem by all who knew her. The many friends of the family here extend sincere sympathy at this time.

The funeral service will be held Saturday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the Redeemer Lutheran church, Central avenue and McGovern street, and burial will be in Memorial Park cemetery.
