Mrs. C. P. Sullivan Dies Suddenly at Her Home; Funeral Friday, 9 A.M.

Mrs. Elizabeth Smith Sullivan, wife of Cornelius P. Sullivan, well known local plumbing contractor, died quite suddenly at 4 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, at the family home, 317 Park avenue. Death was attributed to heart trouble. Mrs. Sullivan had not been in ill health and her death was a great shock to her family and friends.

She was born in Cedarsburg, Wis., was sixty-nine years of age, and had been a resident of Highland Park for fifty-one years. Her husband, C. P. Sullivan, who survives, is one of Highland Park's best known business men and has been in business here for thirty-two years.

Their son, George C. Sullivan, lives in Evanston, and there are three daughters, Catharine M. and Marguerite Sullivan, at home, and Mrs. Helen M. Burns, whose home is in Minneapolis, Minn.

Mrs. Sullivan was a faithful member of the Immaculate Conception church and a woman of sterling qualities and fine personality who won hosts of warm friends during her long residence in Highland Park, and whose death is deeply mourned by all who knew her. The entire community unites in extending sympathy to the bereaved relatives at this time.

The funeral service will be held at 9 o'clock Friday morning, from the Church of the Immaculate Conception, in this city, and interment will be in St. Mary's cemetery, Lake Forest.
