The other ribbon went to Mrs. Robert McKnight, who with the assistance of Mrs. F. C. Atwill, Mrs. M. Hardacre and Mrs. Wm. Ross, created such a charming "porch." A forced crabtree and birch, arranged with evergreens against antiqued, white-washed brick wall, make this exhibit most attractive. An exquisite wrought iron railing on the stairway adds immeasurably to the general scheme, while the planting of tulips, forget-me-nots, and dwarf phlox, completes the delightful setting of an afternoon tea party.

The "Shadow Box" study arranged by Mrs. James Cady Ewell is a thing of rare beauty. Three graceful calla lilies in a pottery vase, with several angel figures placed at their base, suggest an appropriate and appealing Easter study. The accompanying picture, of which the "Shadow Box" is a copy, was also painted by Mrs. Ewell. Mrs. Wm. Mast assisted with this exhibit.

The "Garden Gate" represents the entrance into a Ravinia wild flower garden. Fashioned from an old weathered wagon wheel, the gate itself is most unique and is causing considerable favorable comment. Through the gate, a planting of trilliums, violets, hepaticas, ferns, etc. may be seen against a wooded background. The old log rail fence across the front adds tremendously to the rustic effect, while a cunning squirrel sitting on a mossy stump makes the exhibit appear most natural. Mrs. F. Gault was the chairman of this committee and working with her were Mrs. R. A. Bryant, Mrs. E. E. Leonard, and Mrs. R. G. Maus. The backdrop, a Ravinia wood scene, was painted by Mrs. James Cady Ewell.

The lovely "Little Garden" planted by Mrs. Doretta Klaber, with the assistance of Mrs. E. H. Gleason, Mrs. Ross Marvin, and Mrs. R. G. Smith, is delightful in every detail. A secluded bird bath, surrounded by colorful little pots of pansies, yellow tulips and seedums, against a background of birch trees and shrubs presents an unusually attractive picture. Native birds perched here and there and a nest or two showing through the leaves suggest a bird sanctuary. Placed in front of the bird bath is an artistic iron bench, adding greatly to the general scheme and color effect.
