The Meierhoff buildings are among the oldest in the town, and Fred Meierhoff, before his death last fall, had been a familiar figure in Highland Park for more than half a century.

Woman Bady Hurt and 6 Others Injured in Crash Friday Night

In an auto crash at the intersection of Waukegan and Half Day roads about 7:30 Friday evening Mrs. Selma Hermanson of Waukegan was severely injured and six others received less serious hurts. According to police reports a car driven by John Lobensky of Highland Park was crossing Waukegan road, and the other car driven by Harold Hokans of Waukegan was traveling on Waukegan road. Hokans, it was reported, charged that Lobensky failed to stop before crossing Waukegan road. This Lobensky denied. He was released on bond, Chief Moroney reported. Lobensky says the other car struck his on the side.

Mrs. Hermanson, who suffered a fractured pelvis and other less severe injuries, was taken to the Highland Park hospital. The others injured are Dorothy Hermanson, broken arm and cuts; Eschol Hermanson, bad cut on forehead, bruises, etc; Mrs. Hilda Hokans, fractured arm, bruises about chest and wrist and head hurt; Harold Hokans, cuts and bruises. All were taken to the local hospital, where Hokans was later that night released. All of these are Waukegan people. Lobensky suffered injury to his side and his nephew Frank Parker who was with him, had his collar bone broken. They were taken home. All the injured were reported recovering early this week.
