

Lake Forest College Track Team Shows Up Well in Chicago Meet

With but a few men entered in the annual invitational track meet at the University of Chicago last Saturday, Lake Forest came through in surprising style and garnered 24 points. Carl Parker, all-around star of the team was responsible for 15 of his team's points, having been entered in the pole vault, shot put, and high hurdles. Barry Fitzgerald, a local boy whose home is in the city of Lake Forest, gave the surprise performance of the entire meet when he copped a second place in the 50 yard dash. He took a first in his heat with a time of 5.7 seconds, the same time that the finals went in, in which he was second. Fitzgerald is a sophomore in the college, and will strengthen Coach MacIntosh's squad very much in the dashes, which events were left weak by the withdrawal of Schultz, last year's dash star, from college.

"Condemned!" is a story of romance growing between the mistreated wife of the warden of the prison on Devil's Island and a convict whose sympathy for her plight ripens into love. Unique scenes of the interiors of prisonships and squalid jails, thrilling es-

capades through the tropical jungles, and all the atmosphere of a group of desperate criminals huddled together on what is known as "The Island of Living Death" combine to make "Condemned!" one of the production sensations of the year.

After the wedding ceremony, the

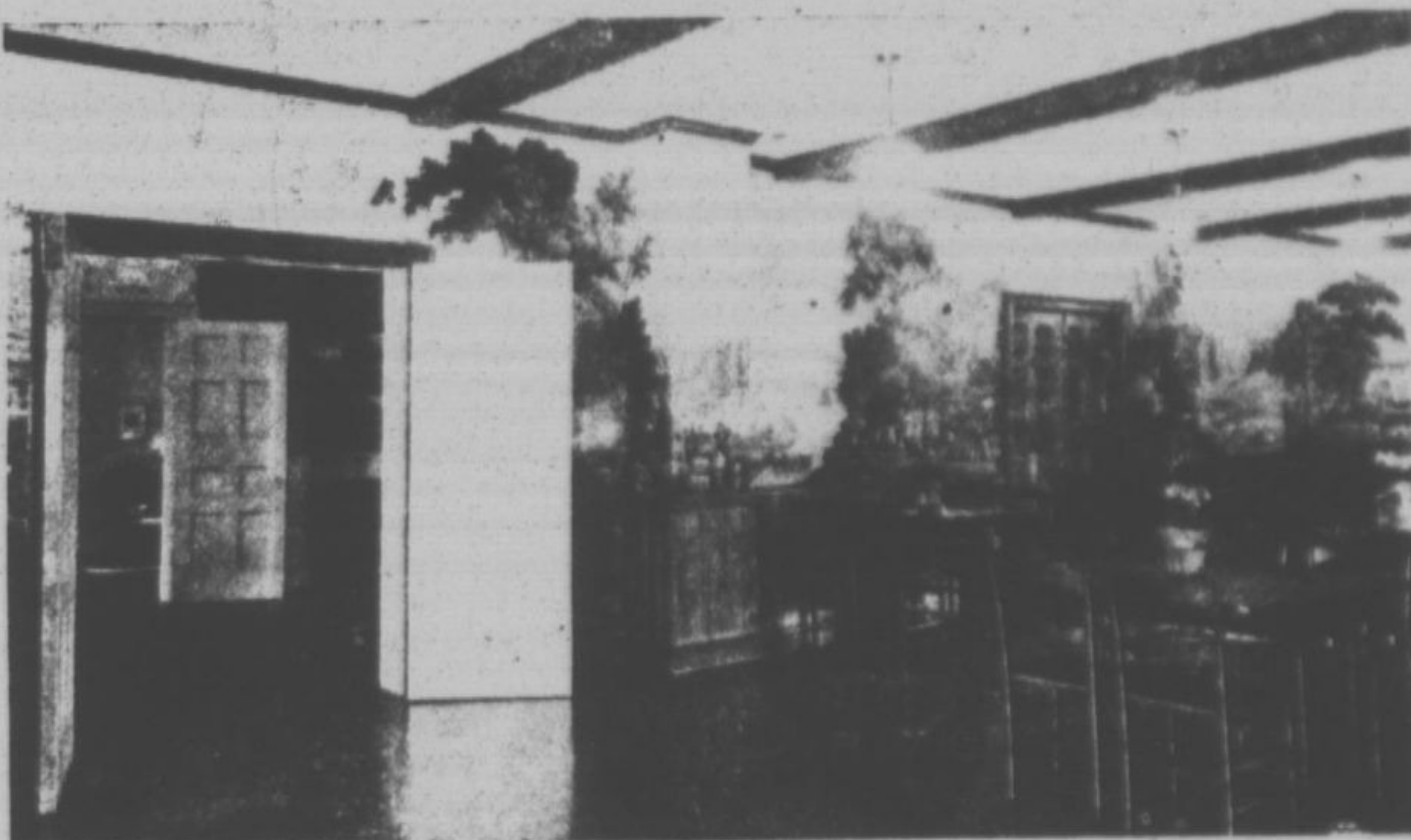
