In the Highwood city election on Tuesday Samuel Pasquesi was elected alderman of the First ward, with a total of 136 votes, according to unofficial figures, defeating Paul Musig, who received 85 votes.

In the Second ward Charles Nelson was unopposed for alderman and was elected.

In the Third ward Edward Cowgill was elected with 86 votes, defeating John Shafer, who received 52.
