DR. COOPER SPEAKS TO P. T. A.; FEATURES

Four Chief Points Made in Address at High School; Good Talk

Parent-Teacher associations here is the heart of Dr. Cooper's talk given last Thursday at the high school. These four points may well be made the basis of a year's work of every Parent-Teacher association.

"To educate our children so that they may be happy and useful members of our democracy the schools must provide:

1. A health program.
2. A leisure program.
3. An educational program.
4. A citizenship program.

Well, the United States Commissioner of Education, Dr. William John Cooper has come to this community and gone! He spoke at the high school last Thursday night to the allied Parent-Teacher associations of district on "The High School and Democracy."

He spoke to an audience of almost three hundred, which is pretty good in this high class district with a total population of around twenty-five thousand. Last year only about two hundred turned out to hear Meiklejohn in spite of all his great newspaper publicity. With all the thousands of children in the local schools of Highland Park, Deerfield, Lake Forest, and Lake Bluff, it is rather significant when congratulations are in order for an audience of three hundred. Subtract the teachers and principles from that number and you get an idea of the number of parents educated enough and interested enough to devote an evening for contact with the man appointed by President Hoover to be head of the Bureau of Education at Washington.

But it was a fine evening, thoroughly worth-while, and the managing committee felt well rewarded for the work undertaken in arranging and financing the evening and also the dinner which a hundred persons attended in the high school lunch room preceding the evening's program.

Oatmeal Cookies

- 2 cups rolled oats
- 2 cups flour
- 1 cup chopped raisins
- ¾ cup butter or other shortening
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- ½ teaspoon salt.
- ½ teaspoon cinnamon
- ½ teaspoon nutmeg
- ¼ teaspoon cloves
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 teaspoon soda dissolved in
- 1 tablespoon water

Mix oatmeal, flour and raisins together. Cream butter, gradually add sugar and cream well together, add beaten eggs and beat until smooth, add other ingredients and mix well into the flour and oatmeal mixture.

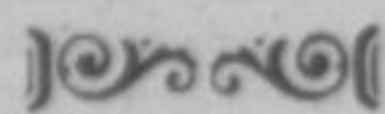
Place on greased pans in rather large teaspoonfuls, dip a knife in warm water and smooth over the top and around sides. Bake at 400 degrees about ten or fifteen minutes, the time depending on the size.
