SUGGESTS CHANGES IN STATE TAX LAW

Illinois Tax Commission in Its Report Recvommends Several Alterations

Twenty-seven specific recommendations for changes in the tax laws of Illinois, as well as proposals for the complete revision of the revenue article of the state constitution, are contained in the tenth annual report of the Illinois State Tax Commission, released today by Chairman William H. Malone. The report is a departure from the earlier reports of the commission in that it contains an extended discussion of Illinois tax problems and recommendations for revenue legislation. The statistical part of the report covers the assessment year 1928.

Recommendations

Among the outstanding recommendations emphasized by Chairman Malone in the commission's report to the governor and general assembly are-the following:

Broad discretion as to tax policies should be lodged in the general assembly, the commission recommends.

Aim to Modernize

Commenting upon the recommendations embodied in the report, Chairman Malone said: "Our purpose is to overhaul and modernize the antique taxing machinery of Illinois, place the assessment of property on a scientific and equitable basis, and wipe out tax fixing, favoritism, dishonesty, and inequalities wherever they may exist in the state. Too Hap-Hazard

"Our present methods of obtaining assessments are too hap-hazard. Large property owners invariably profit under such a system because they know how to obtain and can pay for privileges and low assessments. But the little taxpayer gets the worst of it. He must pay to the hilt and in addition stand part of his tax-dodging neighbor's load. The recommendations outlined in the commission's report will go far toward the correction of evils which have existed too long."
