

**Fire in High School
Attic Causes Damage
Estimated at \$10,000**

Fire from a defective flue leading from a chinaware kiln in the art department early last Friday morning caused about \$10,000 damage to the east wing of the Deerfield-Shields high school building. The fire damage was confined to the attic of the building, but there was considerable water damage on upper floors. As the floors below were of concrete the water did not reach the lower rooms.

John Robinson, watchman at the school, discovered the blaze as he was making his rounds at 2:30 this morning and called the Highland Park fire department. The blaze was going so strong at the time that the firemen immediately called for help from Lake Forest and Glencoe and

The art department of the school is located on the third floor of the building and the fire had eaten into the attic where a large quantity of desks, seats and other school furniture had been stored until it could be installed during the summer vacation. The furniture was badly damaged and while the roof is of slate and would not burn, the rafters under it were badly charred and will have to be replaced.

**Reports Insull Aiding

**Government Report on
Lake Levels Is Issued**

The United States Lake Survey report for the month of March gives Lake Michigan at 580.7 feet above mean sea level which is .12 of a foot higher than the average level for February. Indications are that the level during April will be not higher than 580.90 nor lower than 580.40. The levels for March were 1.60 feet above the average March level for the last ten years, and 2.25 feet below the record high stage for March, 1886, and 3.16 feet above the low stage of March 1926.

In a certain district of Colombia, South America, every chicken killed must be presented to government authorities for inspection.

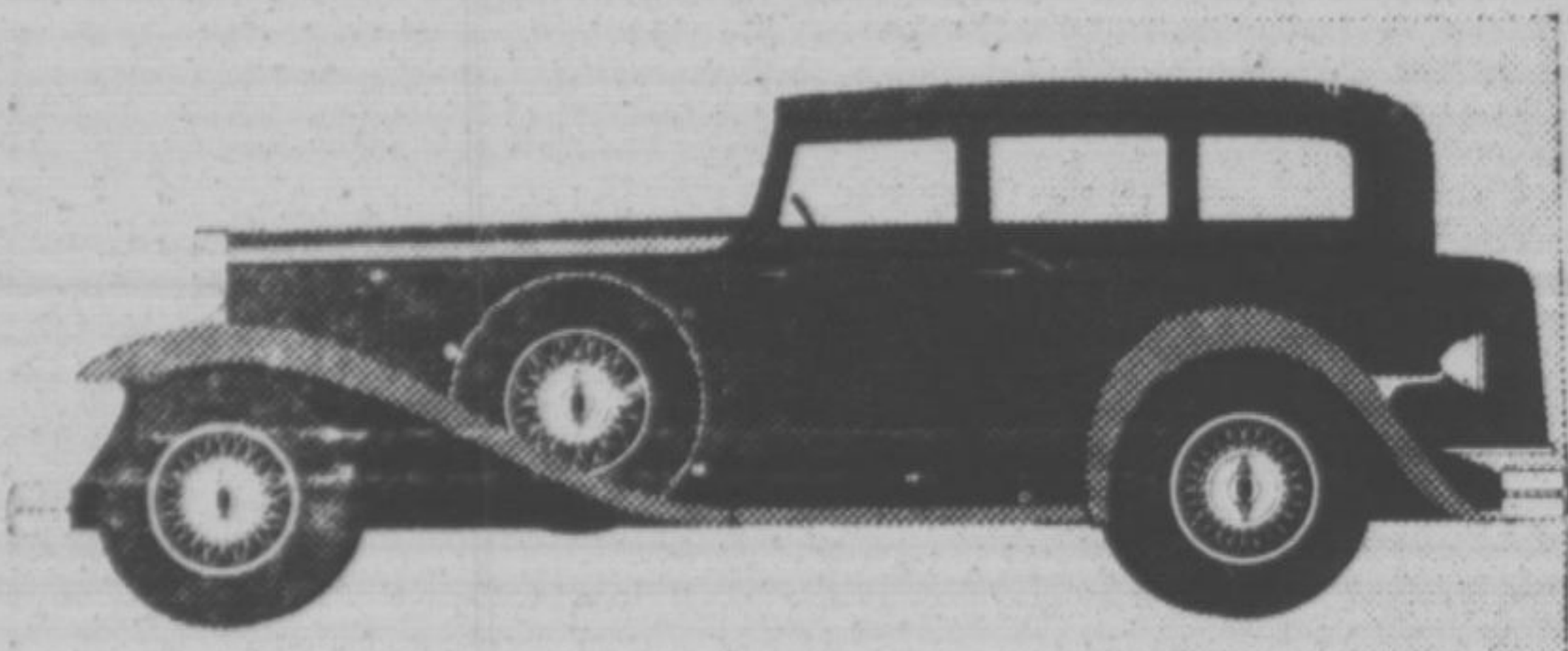
This is not a health measure, such as governs the sanitary slaughter of food animals in this country, but is a requirement to prevent the chicken owner from coming into unauthorized possession of any stray emeralds which may happen to be found in the bird's gizzard.
