extending to the northwesterly city limits of Highland Park, being the center line of Buono Road, at a point on said Buono Road east of and adjacent to the right of way of the Public Service Company of Northern Illinois, also known as the Skokie Valley Route of the Chicago, North Shore & Milwaukee Railroad."

Permit Granted

There was presented a communication from the Reliable Laundry & Dry Cleaning Co., requesting the council to grant a permit for the erection of a temporary building on

their property on Green Bay road north of Vine avenue.

Commissioner Reay moved that the building inspector be instructed to issue as requested with the understanding that the Reliable Laundry & Dry Cleaning Co. will sign an agreement that the building is to be temporary and will be removed in one year and that no gasoline or inflammable liquid will be stored in said building. The motion prevailed.

Lake Forest Voters Defeat Lake Bluff Annexation Project

In Lake Forest city election Tuesday, Mayor A. B. Dick, Jr., was re-elected for his third term without opposition, and his entire ticket with him.

The proposition to annex Lake Bluff was defeated by a majority of 482, and the proposal to bond the city for \$70,000 to purchase a site for the \$250,000 library building offered by Mrs. Kersey Coates Reed and her sister, Mrs. Charles H. Schweppe as a gift to the city in memory of the late Kersey Coates Reed, was favored by the voters who gave the proposal a majority of 946.
