

FILTRATION PLANT NOW IN OPERATION

Work Not Completed and Plant Not Ready for Public In- spection; Details

On Wednesday of last week, April 16, Highland Park realized one of its long cherished ambitions. At eleven o'clock in the morning the valves were opened at the new water works, and for the first time in our history filtered water was being pumped into the mains. Within a few hours the central part of the city began to notice the change. Instead of the liquid mud which had been coming from the taps during the recent stormy weather, the consumers were delighted to see the water gradually clearing up and finally becoming crystal clear. Naturally, the effect was first evident at points near the water plant, and it was several days before the homes in distant sections of the community began to get results.

Mains to Be Flushed

For so many years unfiltered water has been pumped through the mains that the pipes are loaded with large deposits of mud. Until this has been removed by very thorough and studied flushing, we may expect from time to time to be annoyed by a recurrence of dirty water. Any unusual flow in the pipes, such as is caused by drawing water for fire fighting, will stir
