Reports Made

Mrs. Charles Benson, secretary, reported six meetings held during the year.

Mrs. Howell Murray, corresponding secretary, reported 1440 notices sent out, and letters written to state and federal legislators.

Mrs. Jay Glidden, who was appointed treasurer to fill the vacancy left by Mrs. T. A. Moore, and who has consented to go on for the following term, gave the treasurer's report.

Mrs. Robert Walker, membership chairman, reported an increase of 87 members, making a total of 215.

Mrs. Allan Wolff, chairman of Efficiency in Government, whose report was read, spoke of having taken part in the state convention, and of having been invited to attend a hearing of the commission appointed by Governor Emerson for suggestions to cure the defects of the Illinois election laws. She attended numerous state conferences where the proposed legislative program was discussed, including the Civil Service bill, the Council Manager bill and ballot changes.

Mrs. George Buhl, chairman of International Co-operation, spoke of frequent state meetings and studies sent out by the state board.

Reports Progress

Mrs. Raymond Simons, chairman of Legal Status of Women, who has addressed the state group on the Cable act, and who has been asked to serve as a legal status delegate at the national convention, spoke of the progress made in the Women on Juries campaign which will be continued during the summer to prepare for the referendum November 4. She also gave some interesting information concerning the Cable act.

Mrs. George Carr's report on Child Welfare, was read by Mrs. Simons. It was to the effect that since this was not a legislative year for Illinois, there was to the effect that since this was not a legislative year for Illinois, there was no pressing State Child Welfare problem, but in Federal department, the league is very anxious to secure the continuance of the purpose of the Sheppard Towner act—benefitting mothers and children—which is contained in the first Jones-Cooper bill, or the more recent Goodwin bill. She stated that 15 letters had been written from this league to President Hoover, Senator Deneen, and Congressman Chindblom.

Mrs. I. M. Greenberg, chairman of education, reported three meetings during the year.

Hours for Women

Miss Ellen Guiney, chairman of Women in Industry, summed up a very comprehensive report by stating that the league is sponsoring a 48 hour week for women with no night or Sunday work; adequate ap-

Zion Man Suffering Sleeping Sickness

George Efting, 60 year old Zion victim of encephalitis lethargica, "sleeping sickness," has been in partial coma for more than a week. His condition is somewhat improved, according to Dr. J. H. Blanks, but he is not yet able to speak.

Since his state seems to improve and he is able to take nourishment, Efting is expected to recover. Patients have been known to remain in the coma of "sleeping sickness" for as long as a month, and then to regain consciousness and absolute normalcy.



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
