Jury Finds Man Who Mained Couple, Guilty

The jury in circuit court which for two days held in its hands the fate of Sebastian Gotter, who on Dec. 20, 1928, shot and maimed Mr. and Mrs. August Hallmann, wealthy Chicagoans, on their estate near Fouth lake, last week found him guilty of assault with intent to murder, after an hour's deliberation. Judge Shurtleff suspended sentence pending the hearing of a motion for a new trial filed by Gotter's attorneys.

citizen, it shows the good, the humorous and the endearing traits of his character, and as a veritable mirror of life, it brings out an image which to say the least furnishes an excellent evening's entertainment.

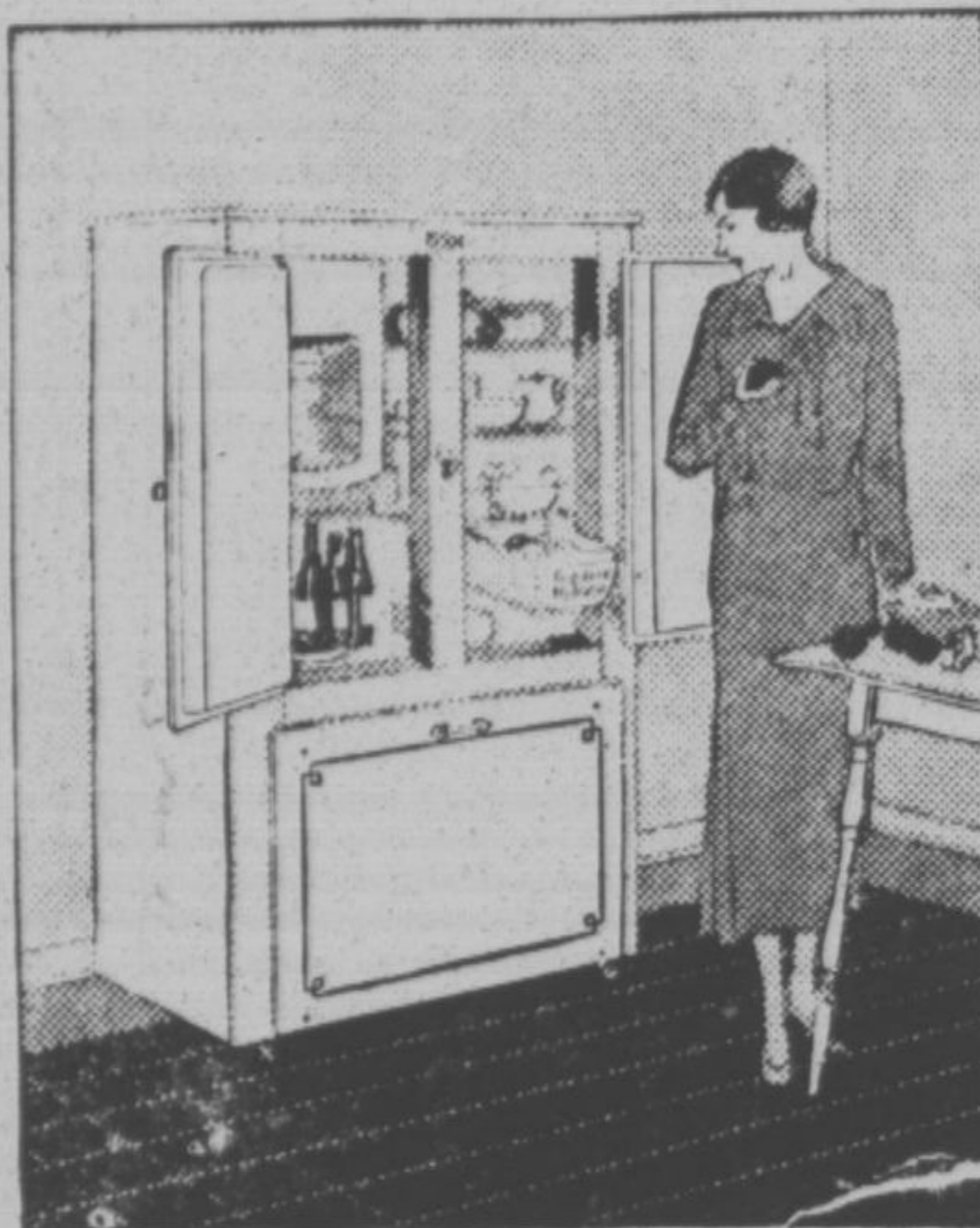
