North Shore Musicians Preparing for Festival to Be Held May 19-24

Assurance that the \$500,000 program of construction which was provided for several months ago by the annual appropriation of the North Shore line will be actually carried out this year was received last week by Building Commissioner Walter H. Nibbelink of Waukegan. The program had been tentatively deferred until 1931; but improved business conditions now warrant the prosecution of the original program, according to John R. Blackhall, general superintendent of the railroad, according to the Waukegan News-Sun.

The three blocks of street car track on County street which will complete the downtown loop will be one of the major elements of the expenditure as far as Waukegan proper is concerned. It will be put in as soon as the city has prepared the way by installing the new County street sewer.

Gates Planned

The replacement of several wig-wag crossing signals on the west line by automatic or hand-operated gates will be another manifestation of the railroad's program which will be welcomed by local residents. Glen Flora crossing, scene of several fatal accidents, is first on the list.

A large share of the appropriation will be expended in building new railroad sidings along the main line between Chicago and Milwaukee. These improvements will be a part of the road's constructive program to increase its freight-carrying capacity.
