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## OPEN THIS WEEK-END

#### Saturday and Sunday Inspection Days; Description of Structure Is Given

Citizens of Highland Park are again reminded that the new city building will be open informally for inspection on Saturday and Sunday, May 3 and 4. Mayors of neighboring cities and former local city officials have been invited to visit the new building in letters sent out by Mayor Benjamin F. Lewis, and a general invitation is extended the people of the city to take this opportunity to familiarize themselves with the new structure.

In description of the new city hall the following statement has been issued by Stanton & Hodgdon, the architects:

#### Description of Building

The new Highland Park City hall has been designed to meet the requirements of a growing city both from the standpoint of its plan and from the standpoint of its architec-While today the building stands in more or less natural surroundings, these surroundings must some day change when various types of buildings will take the place of the trees and ravines. With a far more populated and built up community ahead a building of semimonumental character has been built that will look a part of a suburban metropolis.
