Miss Helen Goldstein of Highland Park has been cast in this part and will have the distinction of being the youngest person ever to play a major role in a Circuit theatre production. Miss Goldstein, who is a freshman at Deerfield-Shields high school, allows us to announce that she is fifteen years old and that she hopes to become an actress. The Circuit theatre seriously presents her in this part as a young lady of considerable talent.

As "Sister's" parents, Ed and Harriet Graham, are cast Fred W. Brey of Glencoe and Mrs. William H. Trout of Northfield. Mrs. Trout, who is a newcomer to the Circuit theatre stage, is well known for her dramatic work with the College Club Players of Chicago and the French Club Dramatic organization of Evanston. Mr. Brey, who likewise is playing with the Circuit theatre for the first time, is well known on the North Shore through both his business and his dramatic connections. Mr. Brey is officially affiliated with the Glencoe State bank and is a very prominent member of the Threshold Players organization of that village.

**Important Character**

A very important character in "The Lady Next Door" is Aunt Ada Towseley, Harriet Graham's older sister, whose visit to the Graham household means a present for "Sister" and a bad week-end for Ed. Mrs. Frank C. White of Winnetka is cast in this part. Mrs. White, who is a member of the board of directors of the Circuit Theatre association, will be remembered for her presentation of the character part of Lady Susan Rucker in last May's production of "The Lilies of the Field."

Maxine Garner Nelson is cast in the rôle of Belle Sheridan, the lady next door. Mrs. Nelson, who is an Evanstonian, has been prominently identified with amateur dramatics in Chicago, but is making her debut with the Circuit Theatre association. The College Club Players of Chicago have had a prosperous season under the chairmanship of Mrs. Nelson and are now preparing an entry in the Drama League contest to be held at the Goodman theatre. Mrs. Nelson is a product of the Chicago Art theatre and will play the rôle of Belle Sheridan in an interesting manner.

Her husband, Bert, is played by Charles J. Eastman of Winnetka, long known as one of the leading actors of the North Shore. Mr. Eastman has been seen in several of the Circuit theatre productions, the more recent of them being "The Detour," "Tons of Money," and "The Dummy." His Winnetka friends will remember him for his recent work in the Community Drama club's production of "In the Next Room."

The cast is completed by Annie, the maid, Bill Saunders, the garage helper, and Dr. Robbins. These parts are played by Jane Gray Doty of Evanston, Ralph S. Alschuler of Winnetka, and Lloyd Faxon of Winnetka.

owned and operated by state, federal and local governments or by churches and fraternal organizations. They represent vast investments of money derived from philanthropic and charitable sources.

"Hospitals, moreover, are becoming the cradle of the race. Nearly one-half of the births in Illinois occur in hospitals. Last year 58,970 babies first saw the light of day in the maternity wards.

"Furthermore, hospitals today are becoming more and more health centers where citizens may go for medical and other expert advice in order to prevent sickness and ill health.

"The high standard of Illinois hospitals is suggested by the fact that 236, nearly two-thirds, are equipped with laboratories and 251 have x-ray departments.

"An average of 51,354 patients are cared for daily by the hospitals and sanatoria. These include 27,298 mental and nervous cases, over one-half of the total, 2,827 tuberculous, 3,825 maternity and 17,404 of all other cases combined.

"There are 32 counties in the state which have no hospitals of any kind but nearly all families in Illinois are within reasonably easy reach of good hospitals."
