To Open Tiny Golf Course in Deerfield

"Fore!"

Yes, you guessed it, the golf season has opened.

In order to make the popular links game available to everyone the Tom Thumb Miniature Golf Course company has opened a campaign in Lake county for the purpose of establishing a diminutive course in every town. It won't be long before the business man with a hankering for the swish of the driver and the rap of the putter will be able to take an hour for lunch and cover 18 holes.

Mr. Robert J. Johnson of Briarhill, Deerfield who is Lake county representative for the Tom Thumb company, declares that the Tom Thumb golf course idea has become extremely popular in all parts of the country. There are already about 100 such courses in Cook county and more are being laid out.

No tiny courses are in Lake county yet, but before Mr. Johnson gets through, he expects to have between one and 10 of them.

Mr. Johnson is planning a course to be laid out on Waukegan road in Deerfield in the very near future.

The Tom Thumb course requires a tract of land about 200 feet long and 100 feet wide. This lot is leveled, trapped and otherwise converted into a golf course, so that 18 holes of play are available. It takes from 45 to 50 minutes to play the course, and the beauty of it is that there are no lost balls, unless an irate player takes a wallop at the pill and knocks it into the factory district. All the essentials such as clubs and balls are furnished by the club.

Hollowed-Out Log Is Traveling Home; to Be at Deerfield Saturday

A comfortable two-room home hollowed out of a big log taken from a Douglas Fir tree will be on exhibit free to the public from 9:00 a. m. to 1:00 p. m. Saturday, May 3. It will be parked at the corner of Waukegan and Deerfield roads, Deerfield.

The big Douglas Fir log home is eight feet in diameter and 16 feet long. The tree from which it was taken was 311 feet high and nine feet across at the base. It started to grow the year Columbus discovered America, 438 years ago, which age is determined by counting the annual rings in the cross section of the log which accompanies the exhibit.

Patrick Powers, a farmer, owns the Douglas Fir one-log home and is making a tour to some of the communities in the Middle West in order to show the school children how a home can be built by hollowing out a big log. The school teachers in most are interested in having their pupils who are studying geography and about the West Coast forest region, inspect and walk through the big Douglas Fir log which visualizes the size of the large trees. As most of the building lumber used in Illinois is now coming from Washington, Oregon, and British Columbia from the Douglas Fir and West Coast Hemlock forests the exhibit is of great interest to adults as well as school students. For this reason the Mercer Lumber companies have brought the exhibit to Deerfield and it will be open for public inspection as a free exhibit on Saturday.

The Douglas Fir one-log home has traveled over 32,000 miles since 1926 through 34 states, and more than a million school children and adults walked through the big log.

Waukegan Woman Has Rare Antique Collection

Mrs. William Oakes, of 15 N. Buttrick street, Waukegan, is the possessor of an unusual collection of antiques. They are the works of R. J. J. Oakes, her father-in-law, who died in 1908 in North Chicago.

Richard Oakes lived in Lake county for some twenty-five years and was recognized as one of the greatest wood carvers in the United States. His most noteworthy legacy to posterity is an intricately carved set of cabinets with figures of birds, animals, dragons, fish and creatures of fact and fancy brought in relief. There are also trees delicately leaved and branches, scenes of savage life taken from Mr. Oakes extensive readings and little interesting features that only an expert would work out and carry into execution.

It took Mr. Oakes many years to finish his task, which included the making of over 200 figures and the work made him a great reputation.

This entire collection which was in the possession of his son William Oakes, who passed away in 1926 is now owned by Mrs. Oakes (William's wife). These rare pieces may be seen at any time by anyone who is interested in antiques, by calling at her home.
