

RAVINIA OPERA CLUB MEETS ON WEDNESDAY

Hears Eckstein Outline Plans for Season at Luncheon in Moraine Hotel

The opening meeting of the season of the Ravinia Opera club was held Wednesday noon, at the Moraine hotel, Highland Park, when about 150 members of the organization were luncheon guests of Louis Eckstein, head of the Ravinia Opera Co.

At this time Mr. Eckstein, who recently returned from New York where he completed final arrangements for the Ravinia opera season of 1930, presented his plans for the season in detail to the club members. This luncheon meeting is an annual affair serving to bring together all of the women's committees and enabling them to discuss their program of activities.

The Ravinia Opera club has been in existence for many years, its purpose being to make Ravinia opera, which is regarded as one of the most important cultural influences of this region, better known to the general public. This organization, likewise takes under its supervision the Thursday afternoon concerts for children, which form an interesting part of every Ravinia season. These concerts are given by the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. The program is especially designed to hold the atten-

Delay in Report Upon Census Here; Deerfield Result Shows Big Gain

Because of the necessity of sending new enumerators into one or two census districts of Highland Park, the result of the census here is not yet available, according to Mrs. Estelle Northam, supervisor of census for this district.

The preliminary announcement of the census for Deerfield, sent out from Mrs. Northam's office gives that village a total of 1,858 on April 1, 1930 as compared with 610 according to the 1920 census, a gain of more than 200 per cent.

The supervisor of census urges that all persons who believe they have not been counted in the census notify her office by postal card, at the Nichols school, Evanston, Illinois.
