Rutter-Tritschler Nuptials

A distinguished event in Spokane's social annals was the marriage of Miss Sally Perkins Rutter to Frederick M. Tritschler, son of Mrs. C. F. Tritschler of Highland Park, solemnized last Thursday afternoon at the home of the bride's mother, Mrs. Isabel Rutter. Stateliness and dignity were the predominating notes of the simple but impressively beautiful ceremony, at which the Rev. Father A. Verhagen, pastor of Our Lady of Lourdes cathedral, officiated. An altar had been improvised about the fireplace and mantel of the living room, with the glow of lighted candles placed the length of the long mantel, rising above the beauty of Easter lilies and calla lilies. On either side were wicker standards filled with lilies, and about the room were clusters of pink roses, tulips and other spring blooms. Preceding the entrance of the bride, who was escorted by her brother-in-law, Thomas W. Symons Jr., Mrs. Mona Quilliam Hull, soprano, sang "O Promise Me," accompanied by Miss Fern Clapp and Miss Catherine Robinson, pianists, and Mrs. Maud Whiacre, pianist.

Miss Rutter, noted for her beauty, was a picture of exquisite loveliness in her wedding gown of ivory silk fine marquisette, fashioned on princess lines, the long skirt touching the floor. The princess effect was ac-

centuated through the tucking at the waistline.

The rounded neckline of the bodice was outlined with a deep bertha of beautiful rose point lace, a gift to the bride from her aunt, Mrs. Charles Morton of Santa Ana, Calif., a sister of Mrs. Rutter. The gown had long mousquetaire sleeves, with cuffs of rose point falling over the hand, terminating in a frill up the side of the sleeve. The bride's veil, which completely enveloped her and extended into a long train, was of ivory-tinted tulle. It fell from a tight-fitting cap with a narrow band under the chin and was held in place by tiny clusters of orange blossoms.

The bride's bouquet was a large cluster of gardenias, combined with sprays of lily of the valley and showered with lilies.

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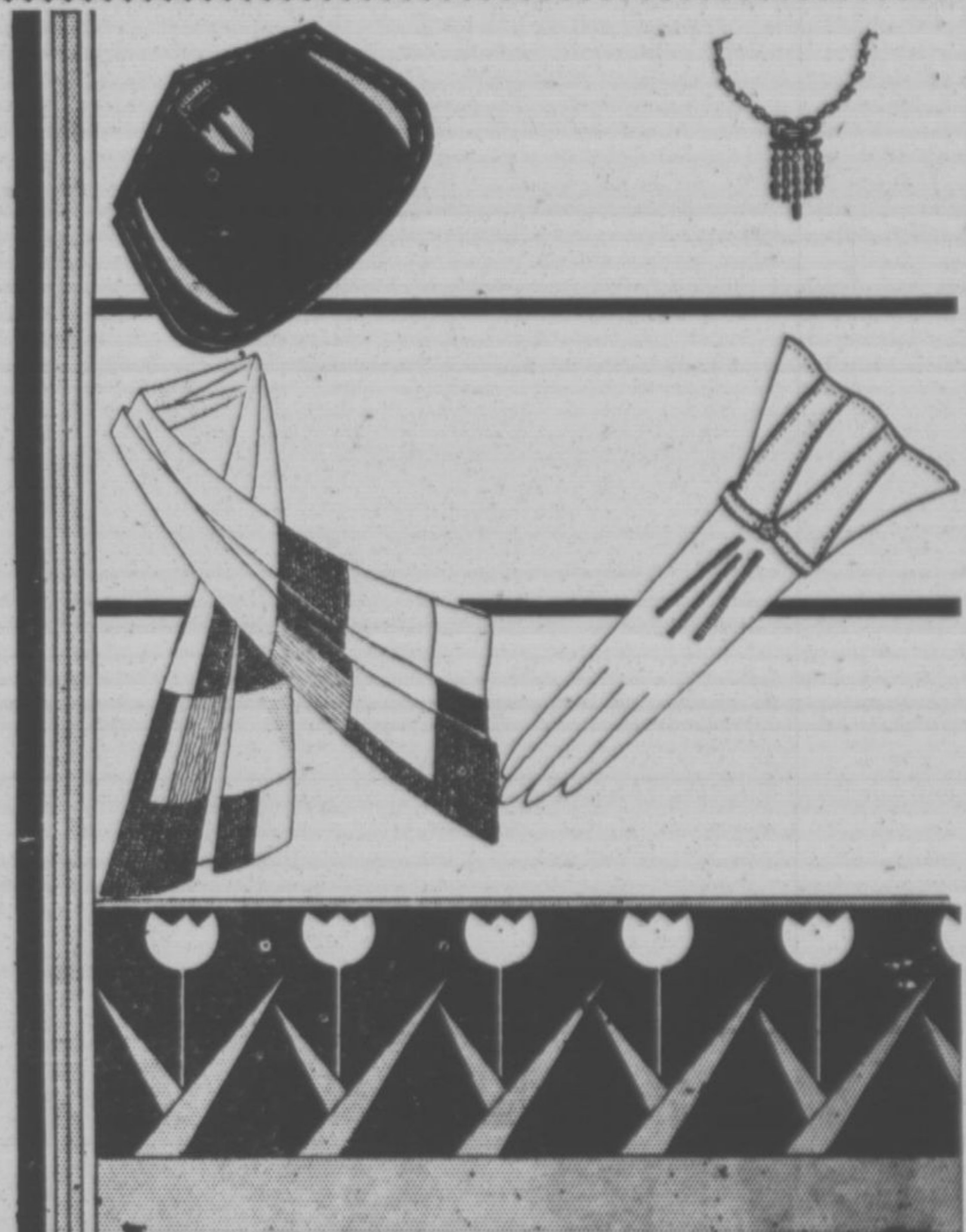
