the greatest dramatic tenor in the well, Lola Monti-Gorsey, Elisabeth Espagnole, Les Hugeuenots (in part), world today, will sing those herculean Rethberg. roles for which he is famous, including Heinrich in "The Sunken Bell" in which he made a profound impression at Ravinia last year. Mr. Martinelli will likewise be heard in "Les Huguenots" which ranks among his greatest roles although he has never sung it at Ravinia.

This year Edward Johnson enters his fifth Ravinia season. He has demconstrated himself as a singer and actor of unusual worth and his repertoire is broad in the Italian, French or German operas. Mario Chamlee, will sing many of the lyric roles for which he is especially fitted. Mr. Johnson and Mr. Chamlee will alternate as Ruggero in "La Rondine," Mr. Chamise will have the principal tenor roles in both "Anima Allegra" and "The Bartered Bride." Armand Tokatyan is coming back for those parts in which he has won popularity. He sings both lyric and dramatic roles. A tenor new to Ravinia patrons is Marek Windheim and another newcomer is Giuseppe Gavadore. Lodovico Oliviero, heard during a part of last season, is to return.

There is no baritone whose voice is of richer quality or who is better noutined than Giuseppe Danise. This artist will again head the baritone section. He has been at Ravinia for eight seasons where he has won unusual distinction. Mario Basiola, likewise a Ravinia veteran, is to sing many of the baritone parts. George Cehanovsky, Louis D'Angelo and Desire Defrere will likewise have many important roles. Leon Rothier and Virgilio Lazzari, favorites of long standing, will head the basso section, Mr. Rothier specializing in French roles, Mr. Lazzari in Italian. Vittorio Trevisan will sing the great buffo parts as will Paolo Ananian.

Same Conductors

The list of conductors is unchanged. Gennaro Papi, Louis Hasselmans and Wilfrid Pelletier all return as principal conductors, and Eric DeLamarter as concert conductor. The assistant conductor is Franco Autori. Giacomo Spadoni will be chorus master and Desire Defrere, stage director. Miss Ruth Page, who has been filling an engagement in Moscow, is coming back to Ravinia as premiere danseuse. Blake Scott has been engaged as premier danseur.

The series of national concerts which have been important attractions at Ravinia are to be continued this year. These will be given on the Sunday afternoons of the season. The children's concerts, will as usual be given on the Thursday afternoons under the auspices of the Ravinia Opera club. It has become necessary during the last two years to utilize the Monday nights in greater part for opera, instead of concerts as formerly. This will no doubt be true again this summer. The Chicago Symphony Orchestra, an important part of the Ravinia organization for many years, has been re-engaged and will play both the opera scores and the concert programs. Another handpicked chorus will in every way measure up to the high standards previously set by the Ravinia ensemble body.


