Deerfield Woman Wins Case in Supreme Court on Special Assessment

Mrs. Mary S. Wessling of Deerfield has emerged victorious from a court battle of several months to keep the village of Deerfield from levying a special assessment to grade, pave, drain Second avenue and acquire by condemnation a 30 foot strip of land running the entire length of the street, it was learned Monday by County Clerk Hendee upon receipt of a decree from the Illinois supreme court, according to the Waukegan News-Sun.

The decree reverses an over-ruling of Mrs. Wessling's objection made several months ago by Judge Persons in the county court. The supreme court decision was framed by Chief Justice Farmer, who held that the special assessment and survey were illegal because one of the commissioners appointed by the city to make the survey was unqualified to act in that capacity.

He was Wilbur B. Brazell of Waukegan. Mrs. Wessling charged that Brazell was by law incompetent to serve as commissioner in Deerfield because he was neither a voter nor a resident of the village.
