## Mr. Clavey Describes Modernistic Garden Shown on Cover Page

The Modernistic Evergreen Garden which we produced in an area 20 feet by 30 feet at the Central States Garden show held in Chicago, was a garden of entirely new design in this country, and all of the plant material (with the exception of the potted annuals) was grown in our nurseries at Deerfield, Illinois, and all are perfectly hardy in the mid-west. I merely mention this to show that the garden is practical and can be successfully constructed on any of the estates on the lake shore on a larger scale.

Berberis Thunbergi was used as a sheared hedge as an edging for the two center beds. The evergreens used were of the following varieties: European, golden, wareana, and pyramidal arbor-vitae; Koster's blue spruce; Pfitzeriana, golden, Canadian, and Cannarti junipers; Austrian and Mugho pines; dwarf Japanese yews, also some golden and red cornus.

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## Highwood Legion Post to Observe Poppy Day on Saturday, March 24

Stupey-Smith Post No. 501, and American Legion Auxiliary of Highwood will hold their annual "Poppy Day" on Saturday, May 24.

"We wear the poppy once a year to express the feeling of reverence that is always in our hearts for the men who died on the poppy-studded fields of France and Belgium during the world war. The poppy is their flower. It grew over their fresh graves; the one touch of beauty and life in all that region of destruction and death known as the front. Nothing can symbolize our remembrance of the sacrifices of the world war dead in so fitting a way as the wearing of the poppy.

"The funds derived from the poppy sale constitute the largest source of revenue for the rehabilitation and child welfare work of the Legion and Auxiliary. 'The little poppy fills the gap.' With the funds from the poppy sale the Legion and Auxiliary step in where the government cannot reach. When you buy a poppy Saturday, May 24, think of the disabled veteran in a hospital or convalescent workshop who has fashioned the little blood-red flower. Think of the fatherless family whose struggles during the coming year will be lightened by the coin you drop into the poppy workers' box.

It's solace—crippled, blind, they try To find on earth the peace they know In Flanders Field."
