

CITY COUNCIL AND BOARD IN NEW HALL

First Meeting Held Monday in Recently Opened Building; Routine Business

The first regular meeting of the city council and board of local improvements in the new city hall building were held Monday evening, with Mayor Lewis presiding. Commissioners Brown and Zimmer also were present and Commissioners Reay and Gourley absent. Routine business occupied most of the session.

At the improvement board session the public hearing on the Taylor avenue pavement was set for May 26, and a resolution was presented, employing Windes & Marsh for engineering work on Route 57. Summary of the council proceedings follows:
