## WOMEN ON JURIES FAVORED BY LEAGUE

**Many H. P. Women Voters Signing Pledge Cards to that Effect, Report**

One of the subjects studied by the Highland Park League of Women Voters this year was "Women on Juries." Mrs. Raymond Simons, chairman of Legal Status of Women, reported that 75 pledge cards favoring the measure had been signed by Highland Park members of the league.

Miss Esther Dunshee, Chicago lawyer and chairman of the Illinois Joint committee for Women on Juries, added ammunition to the jury campaign recently in a speech given over W. G. N. for the League of Women Voters. The joint committee comprises some 11 woman's organizations including the Illinois Federation of Women's clubs, Woman's Bar association, and League of Women Voters, which organizations are leading the campaign for jury service for women which will be decided by referendum November of this year.
