

IMPORTANT WATER NOTICE The City's new filter plant has been in operation since April 16th, and only clear water is being pumped into the distribution system. However, the old water mains hold large deposits of mud, and the public is warned that from time to time this mud is likely to show at at the taps. This is usually caused by an excessive use of water, necessary opening of hydrants, or cutting in of mains. Upon the final completion of the new water plant, some weeks hence, when the necessary surplus water will be available the mains will be given a thorough flushing. Until this has been done the public is asked to be patient and to remember that any muddy water coming from the taps is the result of the deposits in the mains, and dom not come from the filter plant; V.
