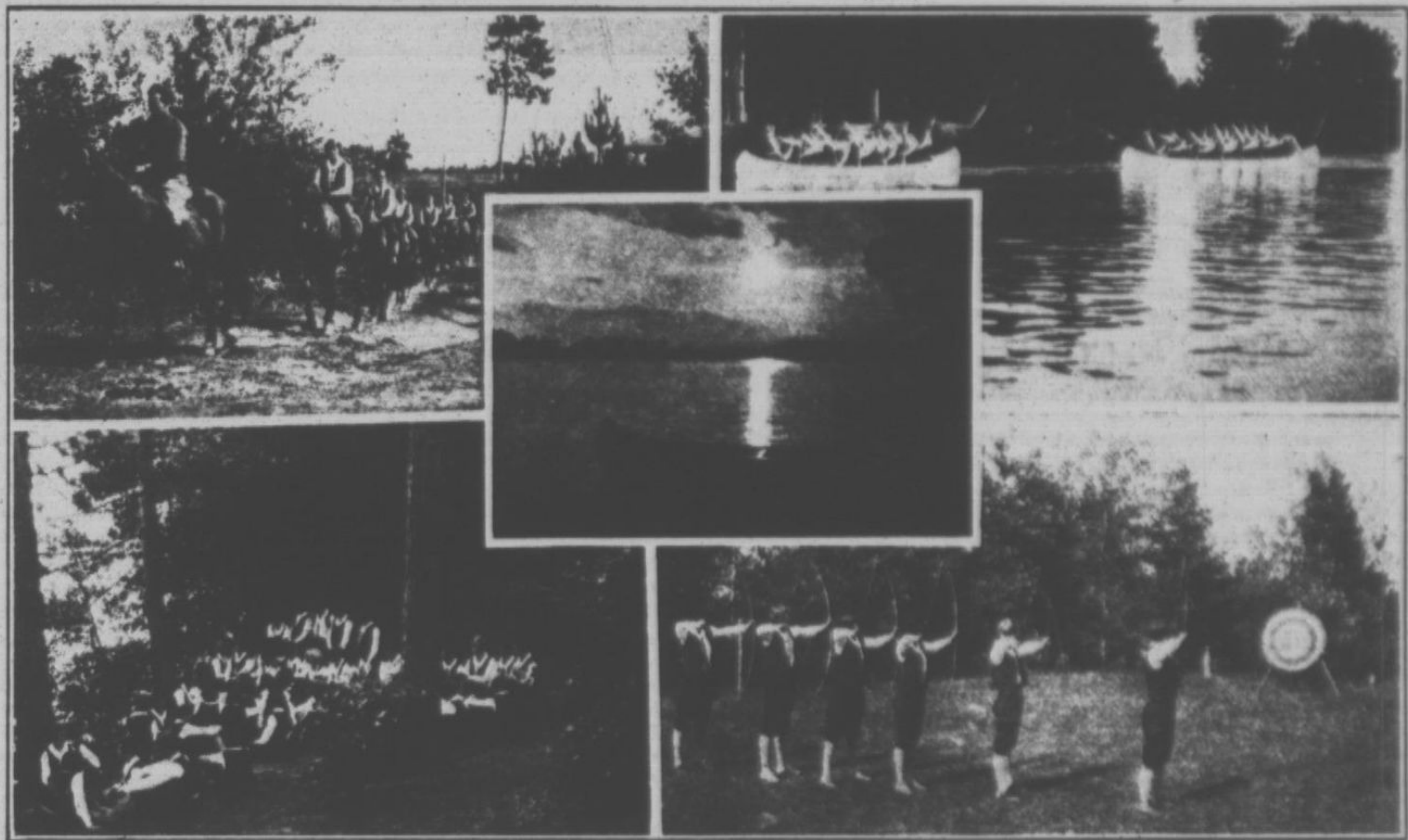

ADVANTAGES OF CAMP LIFE DISCUSSED BY MISS KING

"To enjoy camp a girl doesn't have to be an athlete, as the modern camp includes so many other fascinating activities besides sports," said Miss King, Deerfield-Shields teacher, to a group of high school girls last week.

Camp interests include nature study and arts and crafts work, besides the regular sports. Through organized activities the girls, besides spending a summer of pleasure, really learn what is valuable to them later in life.

In addition to the private camps, there are girl scout camps. A girl may earn her own way in some of these camps.

A number of girls from Deerfield-Shields have attended Camp Bryn Afou, in Wisconsin, where Miss King and Miss Thompson go each summer. This camp is at Rhinelander, about 350 miles from Chicago. A private lake offers swimming as well as canoeing. There is horseback riding as well. Tennis, hockey, baseball, and basketball have their place in the activities. The arts and crafts work includes the making of jewelry and basket weaving. Clog dancing, pageants, and tournaments, as well as dramatics, play an important part in camp life.

The councilors are all college graduates; there is a councilor to every three girls. For sleeping quarters

there are cabins with accommodations for seven, six girls and a councilor.

"High school and college mean more to a girl after she has attended a camp," continued Miss King. "Leaders in school and on the campus are usually girls that have had the advantages of camp life."

The Illinois League of Girls' Athletic association camps will be held June 15 to 25 at the Bowen Country club, north of Waukegan. The price for one week is \$15, for the entire time, \$25.
