SUBURBAN BUILDING SHOW SOME GAINS

Twenty-Five Towns Report Increases Over March in April Reports

The upward trend in building construction in Chicago suburbs, which began two months ago, reached a new high mark in April 1930.

Twenty-five comparable suburbs of forty included in a survey by S. W. Straus & Co., reported substantial gains over last March. For the month just closed the entire group registered a total of \$3,323,052 as against the March volume of \$2,811,742.

Leading the field are two of nine west side suburbs reporting gains. Glen Ellyn tops the list with an increase of 1,920 per cent, while Elmhurst takes second place.
