

Appointment Made at Meeting Monday of Village Board

On Monday evening, May 5th, at the Masonic Temple, the village board of Deerfield convened. Following a brief business session presided over by President W. W. Geary, the newly elected president, James Hood, took the chair and two trustees, Christ Willman and Ira Hole, who succeeded F. J. Labahn and Conrad Uchtman.

In a short talk before leaving, Mr. Geary urged that the board and the people of Deerfield lend their hearty support and co-operation to the new president.

Before calling the board to order for business Mr. Hood outlined a few things he hoped to do for Deerfield in the near future, things which no doubt would not only be a credit to it but make it one of the choicest spots along the North Shore.

On motion of Commissioner Zimmer, Arthur Bulkley was allowed a payment of \$250 on account of legal services in connection with the suits of Wallen vs. city of Highland Park and Cowie vs. city of Highland Park, in accordance with the resolution passed by the council on April 9, 1928.

Adopt Resolutions
On motion of Commissioner Brown final adoption of a resolution retaining Bowen E. Schumacher as special counsel for the city in making of the Taylor avenue improvement was voted.

On motion of Commissioner Zimmer final adoption of a resolution authorizing a contract between the city and Windes and Marsh, for the rendering or furnishing of engineering services was voted.

Commissioner Brown moved and the council approved the adoption of a resolution presented by the Illinois Municipal league and addressed to the state legislature.

Submit Ordinance
The board of local improvements submitted an ordinance providing for a local improvement, consisting of the acquiring of a right-of-way and widening an existing right-of-way for a public street and sidewalk from the south city limits of the city of Highland Park, at a point in the southerly boundary line of Lot 2 in the subdivision of the west 22½ acres of the south 30 acres of the east one-half of the southwest quarter of section 35, Township 43 north, Range 12, east of the third principal meridian, and extending to the northwesterly city limits of Highland Park, being the center line of Bueno road, at a point on said Bueno road east of and adjacent to the right-of-way of the Public Service Co. of Northern Ill., also known as the Skokie Valley route.

Commissioner Brown moved that the ordinance as read remain on file with the city clerk for public inspection complete in form until its final passage. The motion prevailed.
