How the Library Spent Its Money Highland Park spent \$ 15,604.88 last year for the maintenance of its library, of which \$1545.87 was received in fines, interest, donations, etc., \$8,-709.34 of this went for salaries. The recommended division (Reasonable Budgets for Public Libraries, by O. R. H. Thompson) of a public library provides between 55 per cent and 60 per cent for salaries. \$8,709.34-\$15,604.55 per cent. 20 per cent is the recommended figure for books, binding and periodicals. For these \$4,820.23 was spent. This is 30 per cent of the total expenditures. This left only 15 per cent for maintenance, which is a low percentage.
