Observe "Poppy Day" in Deerfield May 24

Saturday, May 24, will be "Poppy Day" in Deerfield. Arrangements for the annual sale of memorial poppies to be worn in honor of the World War dead are progressing rapidly under the sponsorship of the local unit of the American Legion Auxiliary, Mrs. Harry Maw unit president, announced today. May 24, the Saturday before Memorial day, will for the need is greater than ever. A brance go on sale throughout the city.

"The Saturday before Memorial day has been adopted almost everywhere in the United States as the day for paying tribute to the men who lost their lives in the World war by wearing the poppy," Mrs. Maw explained. The Deerfield unit of the Auxiliary is preparing to give every man, woman and child in the city an opportunity to wear the poppy this year. We will have our poppy workers in all parts of the town throughout the day and hope by the end of the day to have placed a poppy on every coat.

"The wearing of the poppy has a double significance," Mrs. Maw continued. "The wearer not only honors the war dead but in buying the poppy contributes to the welfare of the disabled and the families of the dead and disabled. Every penny which the Auxiliary receives from the sale goes directly to the relief of disabled veterans and the families left dependent because of the war. The poppies are made by disabled men and all the work of the sale is done by volunteers from the Auxiliary.

"The citizens of Deerfield have always made a generous response to the American Legion and Auxiliary poppy sale. I hope that the response can be even more generous this year for the need is greater than ever. A poppy on the lapel May 24 will mean honor to the dead and service to the living."

To Ask Aid of City

The meeting decided to ask the cooperation of the city authorities of Highland Park to secure a sufficient number of signatures to a petition to the state department for the formation of a mosquito abatement district.

The remainder of the evening was devoted to a discussion of Cary avenue sewer conditions. The chief address on this topic was by President John Oliver of the North Shore Sanitary district, who explained that the district was unwilling to attempt permanent relief for Ravinia from this condition, which he admitted was unsatisfactory, until such time as his district could put before the voters of the entire district a general bond issue covering a sewage disposal project at several locations from Waukegan to Cary avenue. It is hoped, however, that Ravinia will get some temporary relief this summer.

It was the sense of the meeting that Cary avenue should be closed to bathers unless such relief was given providing the city health authorities finding coincides with the state health department's opinion as to the danger existing.
