### DAMAGED BY FIRE

Several Tenants Suffer Losses; Total Probably \$33,000 in Blaze Early Tuesday

Fire which broke out about 2:30 the blaze started from an electrical the right of the picture. appliance in the rear of the J. Winstanley Briggs upholstery shop.

The fire was discovered by Night Patrolman Richardson of the police force. There was no evidence of fire when he passed the front of the building, but when he went around to the rear he saw a blaze which appeared to be in the lower part and then suddenly flames burst from the upper part, evidently due to explosion of pent-up gases inside. As he hurried to sound the alarm, he said, he thought he heard another blast as more windows were blown out.

Highwood Firemen Aid The entire force of the fire department was soon on the ground and aid was summoned from Highwood. The latter department made a quick run and gave splendid service in helping to cut through the roof and elsewhere so that water could be thrown on the fire, Chief Hoskin said. The fire departments fought a hard battle until 7 o'clock, as the flames had penetrated into the attic and be-
