

## LEGION COUNCIL'S DEERFIELD MEETING

### District Well Represented at Session Friday Evening; Proceedings

Led by a contingent of twelve motorcycle policemen thoroughly enjoying themselves amid the backfiring of their machines the parade which preceded the Lake County Council meeting of the American Legion Friday night, marched around Deerfield. Sharvin Drum and Bugle Corps followed the noisy advance guard; then the colors of the various posts, with a uniformed and armed guard furnished by Libertyville Post. Approximately two hundred Legionnaires made up the body of the marching column.

Because of illness, George Briggs, commander of Deerfield post, was unable to open the meeting. Vice-Commander Carl Stadler presided in his absence. After a brief opening ceremony he turned the gavel and meeting over to Commander Kapschull.

After calling the meeting to order and dispensing with most of the business in short order, Commander Charles C. Kapschull of the Eighth District, introduced the speakers of the evening, among whom were:

Comdr. Billy Runnels of 12th dist.; Micky Boyle, chm., of Poppy Day committee; Tom O'Farrell, Junior Vice-Commander of Illinois; Penz Orr, comdr. of 11th dist.; Dr. Ben Corwyn of North Chicago hospital; Art Berson, comdr. 13th dist.; Jack Foreman, Senior Vice-Comdr. of Ill.; and Mr. O'Meara, division comdr., who bore a message from the State Commander, Ed Hayes.

#### Dr. Antoine Speaks

Dr. Harry St. Antoine, in charge of the hospital at North Chicago, described the various activities he and his associates there have put under way for the benefit of patients. He said in part:

"We are trying to get away from the prison or hospital effect. We try to treat all our cases (which are mostly mental disorders) as sick veterans. From this angle we have put on a program of indoor and outdoor activities that have proven very helpful to our wards. An athletic director has charge of work in his line, to which the men have quickly responded. A baseball diamond has been laid out and teams from the various sections of the hospital play a regular schedule. A drum and bugle corps is in full swing. Long hikes are taken with the drum and bugle corps leading the way—over 700 men are often in the ranks. A color guard raises and lowers the flag at the proper times; the men take great pride in their part of this work. Bus rides are given daily. Calisthenics is another activity proving very helpful to our men. We invite Legionnaires and the public to visit us and see what we are doing for the disabled men."

The doctor closed his remarks with words of praise for "Scotty," trainer of Sharvin Post Drum and Bugle Corps, and others who have given largely of their time to aid him in his great work.

#### Raise Fund

Among other things brought by Dr.

Antoine was the need of six more bugles and two drums to complete the corps at the hospital. Art Montgomery suggested that the hat be passed to collect the money at this meeting. This was done. It was discovered with the aid of a small fund previously offered by Bill Woodard, the amount needed was oversubscribed, much to the joy of the doctor and those present.

#### Prize Awarded

Prizes awarded for various activities in Legion work were then awarded by Commander Kapschull. Commander "Ekkie" Carlstrom of Stupey Smith post, Highwood, was given the State Junior Vice-Commander's Cup for having reached the highest membership percentage increase in the state. Other prizes were also awarded, a list of which will be published later.

#### Baseball League

Archie Maplethorpe of Antioch reported a league of junior baseball teams had been organized in Lake county, a full schedule of games to be announced later.

Mr. Pietro Marchi, tenor, and Miss Enid Pierce, accompanist, rendered several operatic selections that received the approbation of the crowd.

North Chicago's comedy trio, Jerry, Ravioli and Nelson, put on their skit which as usual brought a roar of approval from the gathering.

The meeting closed with the announcement that a district convention would be held in the hospital auditorium, the date of which is to be decided upon by the committee of Bob Gullie, chairman, Vic Woertz and Len Hook.
