PLAN MASS MEETING ELM PLACE SCHOOL

Citizens Invited to Discuss Archaic School Laws on Monday Night

The Citizens' committee on grade school education in Elm Place, Green Bay district, have called a mass meeting for all citizens interested in the school system, to consider action on out-of-date school laws. The meeting will be held at 8 p. m. next Monday evening at Elm Place auditorium. The Hon. B. F. Lewis, Mr. E. C. Wolcott, and Mr. R. Arthur Wood will be the principal speakers.

The following excerpts from the committee's announcement explains the condition that led to calling the meeting.

Explanation of Purpose

"Few citizens probably realize that our children are attending schools that operate under laws that have remained unchanged since 1870. Laws that were passed when we were still recovering from the effects of the Civil war and before the great Chicago Fire, are hard for an enlightened and thoroughly modern community to justify.

"The citizenry here demands a better school system than is to be found

Memorial Service to Be Held Friday A. M.

A community Memorial service will be held Friday morning in front of the monument in Triangle park on Laurel and Prospect avenues, under the direction of Dumaresq Spencer Post, American Legion.

A parade will start at nine-thirty in the morning at the City Hall on S. St. Johns avenue, and will proceed north on St. Johns avenue to Central avenue, west on Central to Linden, south on Linden to Laurel and to the monument. All members of the American Legion and Legion Auxiliary, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, school children and the Elm Place band will take part in the parade.

A program will be given in the park, the Rev. H. F. Siemson, pastor of Bethany Evangelical church, being the principal speaker.

It is hoped that the citizens of Highland Park will show their patriotism to those heroes who gave their lives for their country by attending this service.

At the conclusion of the program, the members of the Legion will go to Mooney's cemetery where they will decorate the graves of soldiers.
