Alice (a 1930 mother) peeped through the garden keyhole and there, stretched out before her very eyes, lay sixteen little cots, and upon each little cot lay one little child, fast asleep under the blue of the sky and the green of the trees and shrubs. For this was the modern out-of-door sleeping place of the Open Air Nursery school, 861 N. Sheridan road.

And this is what you will find any day if you visit the school. If you should come in the morning you will find these children enjoying all manner of outdoor exercise and play, from climbing and swinging to digging in their own gardens. And their appetites are appeased by lunches served outside. Each day has the festive, though calm, air of a picnic.

Many a mother is awed at what seems to be the magic accomplished by the school in ironing problems of eating and sleeping, and other personal problems which have, at home, been trying, but which soon disappear. The psychology of the group plays a very important part in bringing about this magic—a thing which is often impossible at home, because of small families or few neighbors. And when children are happy and the mothers have more time for recreation themselves, there are apt to be far less problems at home.

The garage will be used for flower exhibits also the porches.

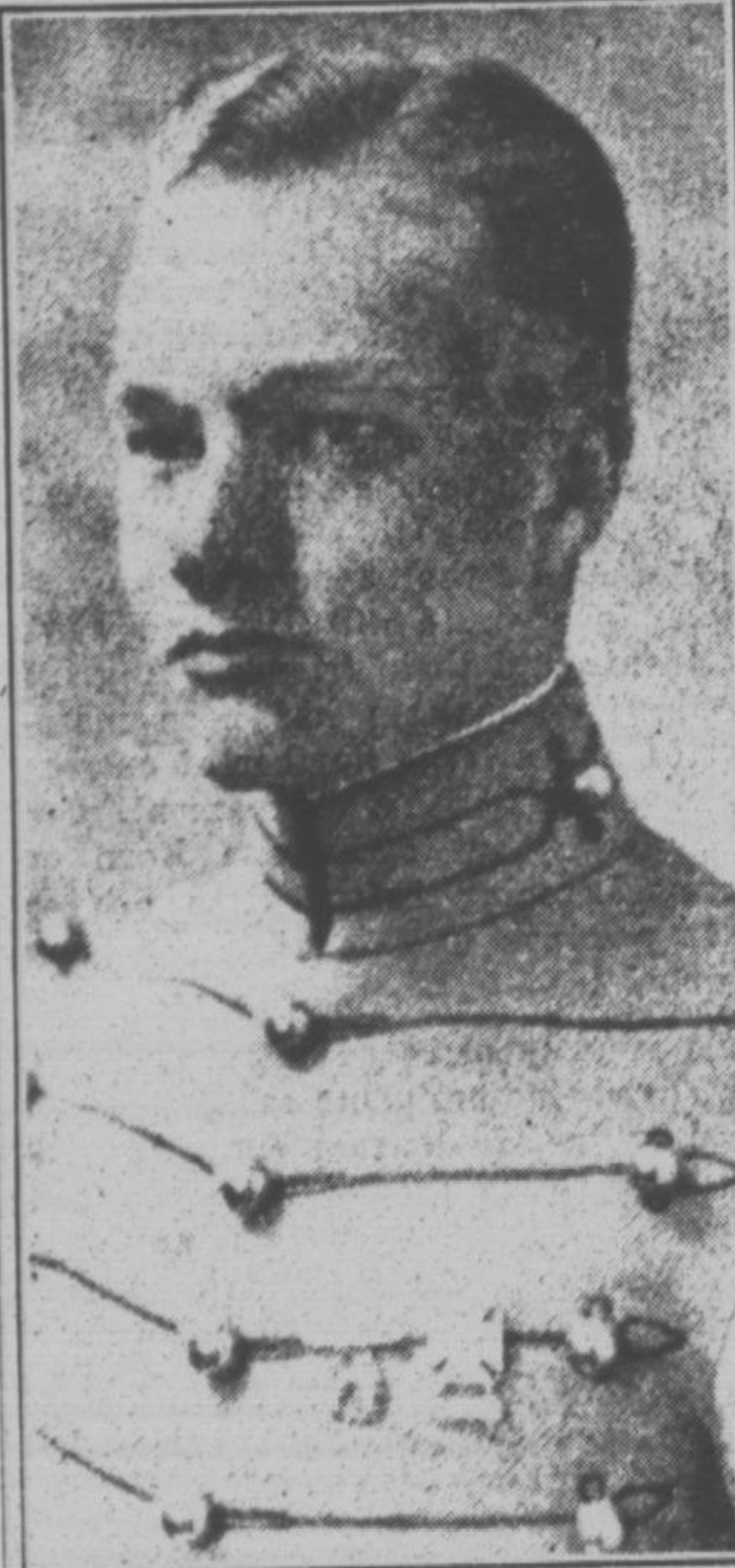
You will be interested in seeing the beautiful rock garden and pool on these grounds.
