LOCAL SEA SCOUTS TO CRUISE ON LAKE

Sea Scouts from the North Shore Area council, Boy Scouts of America, will cruise on one of the famous "Down East" fishing schooners this summer. This vessel, the "S.S.S. Pinta" is provided by the Sea Scout committee of Region Seven which comprises the states of Illinois, Indiana, Michigan and Wisconsin. Thorne Donnelley, Lake Forest, is the chairman of this committee.

The "Pinta" is an auxiliary schooner yacht adapted to the use of Sea Scouts for training and cruising purposes, and is particularly suited for this because of its unusually sturdy construction. She is 105 feet long, 25 feet wide and can accommodate 60 boys and leaders at one time.

A program is worked out for each day and instruction will be given the scouts in all phases of sailing, seamanship and navigation. They will stand "sea-watches," sleep in ham-

ocks like regular "tars," and in general, there will be a "sea-going" atmosphere prevailing at all times.

One of the features of the ship's equipment is a Zenith Radio outfit donated by Mr. E. F. McDonald which will enable the vessel to keep in constant touch with shore stations or other ships. A diesel engine contributed by Mr. Donnelley will provide the auxiliary power although this will be used only when a lack of wind makes it necessary to do so. Chicago is designated as the home port of the "Pinta" and most of the cruises will start from there although two cruises have been scheduled to start from Michigan ports.
