SCHOLARSHIPS GIVEN TO MANY STUDENTS

Scholarships are to be awarded to many students who are graduating from Deerfield-Shields this year.

The list of awards include the two year scholarship to the University of Chicago, the scholarship to Harvard, the one for a Lake Forest girl for Lake Forest college, the fund donated by the Highland Park Ossoli club, which is the woman's branch of the Highland Park club, and the Deerfield-Shields Scholarship fund.

John Horn, of Ravinia, was chosen for the Chicago "U" scholarship, which was won by Tom Lester last year.

Richard Neff received the Harvard alumni scholarship. This provides \$500 a year.

Girls Receive Scholarships

Dorothy Maiman and Henrietta Jenkins were the girls to receive scholarships. Dorothy is going to Lake Forest, and Henrietta, who received the Ossoli award, is going to Northwestern.

Seven boys were chosen to receive help from the Deerfield-Shields Scholarship fund, which was donated, to quote the curriculum handbook, "through the generosity of friends of the school who wish to remain incognito." The boys are Earl Gossweiler, Clarence Huetton, Dan Maloney, Fred Drakeman, James Cuffy, Richard Neff, and Arthur Magnani. The fund is not sufficient to pay all expenses, but it will help a great deal.

Medals Awarded

Two gold medals have been donated by the Dumaresq Spencer post of the American Legion. One of the medals, the "Valedictorian Medal," will go to the student who has the highest average in grades in the graduating class. Wilda Miessner will receive it this year.

The other medal presented by the American Legion is for the boy who is the school's best athlete. In addition to being a good athlete, the boy has to be of good character.

Alumni Give Medal

In addition to these medals, the class of 1907 annually presents a medal to the student who is voted by the teachers to be the best all around student in the graduating class. To be taken into consideration when judging is accuracy, scholarship, character, application, perseverance, school spirit, and fidelity.

In order to be eligible for this award, the student must have an average of at least 80 during his or her fourth year and must complete the regular four year course in four years. The medal is known as the "Medal of Honor."

Tom Moore is planning to go to the Yale Dramatics school. Tom, you will remember, was in the casts of "The Poor Little Rich Girl" and "Seven Keys to Baldpate." He has also taken part in several of the Garric plays.

Faith Foyer is planning to go to a dramatic school, too.

THIRTY-EIGHT COLLEGES ARE SENIOR PREFERENCES

Thirty-eight different schools, colleges, and universities are being considered by the members of this year's Deerfield-Shields graduating class. Forty-five students plan to work next year, nine are not planning to be graduated, eighteen are still undecided, and one February graduate has been married.

Lake Forest college has the most representatives, seventeen. Northwestern is second with twelve, the University of Illinois third with eight,

and business schools next with six. Five plan to attend art schools, one a music school, and two dramatic schools.

Five plan to take a post-graduate course, one is going to a private school, two to junior colleges, and two are to take up nursing.

Armour, Chicago, and Grinnell will each have three, De Kalb four, Wisconsin, Beloit, and Massachusetts Institute of Technology two, and Dartmouth five.

The following colleges will receive at least one representative from here: Milwaukee Downer, Connecticut,

Carleton, Loyola, Lewis Institute, Parsons, Boston School of Physical Education, Archford, Deep Springs, Annapolis, Wheaton, Boston Tech, Duke, Harvard, Notre Dame, Curtis Aeronautical school, Moser, and Mt. Vernon Seminary.

RABBI MANN SPEAKER AT COMMENCEMENT

Reverend Dr. Louis L. Mann, Ph.D., will be the speaker at the 1930 commencement, which will be held in the auditorium on Thursday evening, June 12, at 8:15 o'clock. He will speak on "Education and Life."

Dr. Mann is from the Chicago Sinai congregation, and is also a professor at the University of Chicago, besides being a prominent figure in countless other organizations. His home is in Chicago.

Two Student Speakers

Wilda Miessner, the highest in scholarship in the senior class, has chosen as her speech "The Bard of Mantua," while William Ellis, second highest in the senior class, will speak on "The Program of Peace."

First on the program the orchestra, under the direction of Mrs. Mannings, will play two numbers, "Bohemian Girl" by W. Balfe, and the "Barcarole Waltz," from Tales of Hoffman, by Offenbach.

The invocation and the benediction will be given by Reverend Alan Billman, pastor of the Methodist church of Lake Forest.

The Boys Glee club, under the direction of Mr. Dinkeloo, will sing "By the Sea" by Fearis. Virginia Engels will play a piano solo, "Sonnet 104 from Petrarca," by Liszt.

Honors and Diplomas

Mr. Sandwick will present honors to different members of the class, while Mr. George J. McBride, president of the Board of Education, will present the diplomas.

The program will be closed by the singing of "America" by both the audience and the class.
