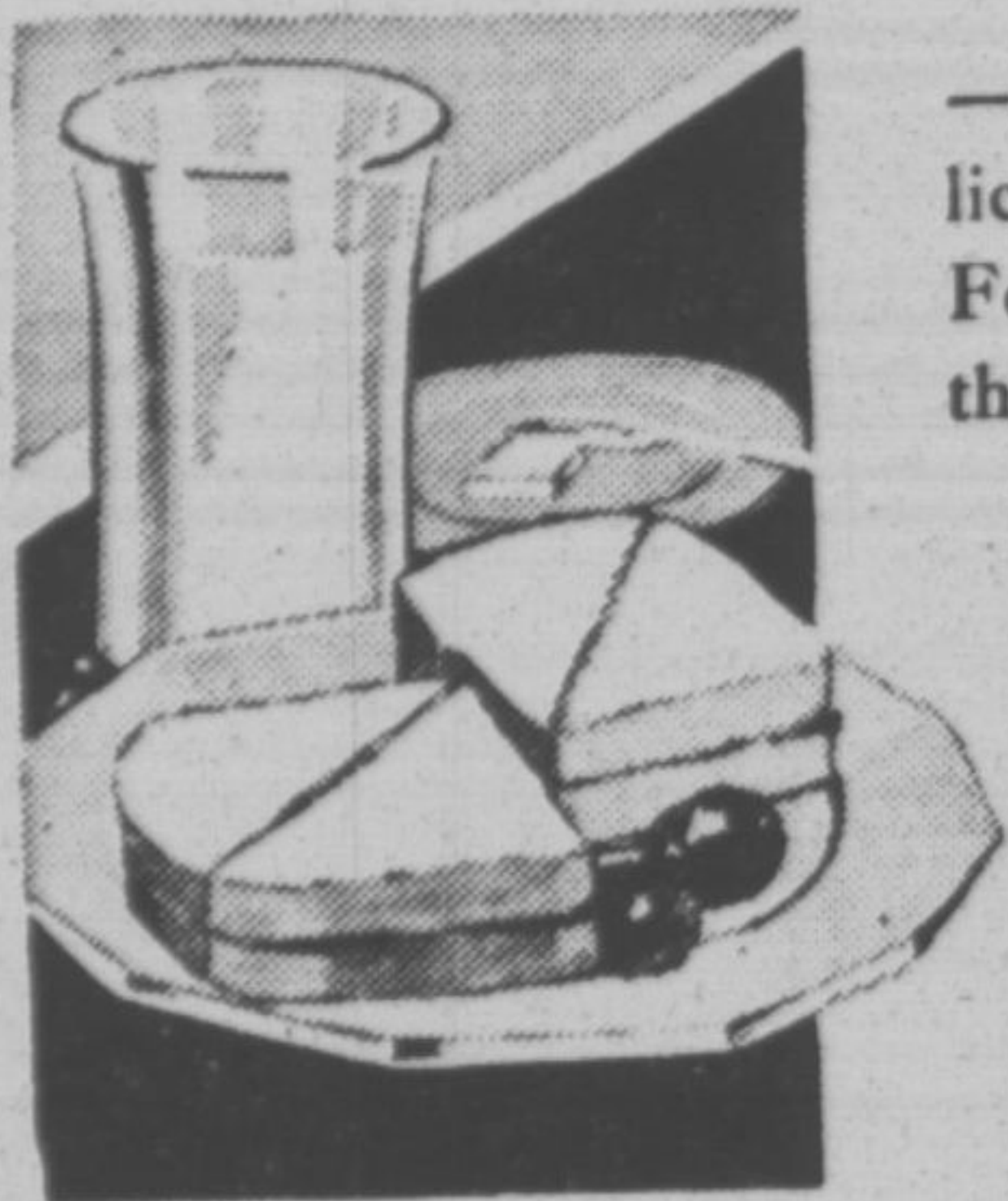

Not Adequate

"School laws of the mid-nineteenth century will not suffice under the conditions created by the tempo of our modern business and social life. Children today need a better education than their parents had, in order that they may be geared-up to meet the conditions that will face them in the years to come. Our school system is now facing a crisis — your presence is needed at this meeting.

The committee is very anxious to have every citizen with an interest in providing the children of this community with the best of educational facilities, attend the meeting. They feel that effective results can be obtained only through the united action of the citizens of the community.

Lightning Fires Barn Tuesday; Loss Is Total
