lowing the world war, too much reliance on the federal reserve system, too many large loans on farm lands and city real estate, and the present agricultural depression.

Appel cup, awarded annually to the section of the state association which most thoroughly carries out the policies of the organization, was presented to Group Four by Lyon Karr, Wenona, president of the Illinois Bankers' association. N. L. Johnson, group chairman, made the acceptance speech.
