

### BOWMAN DAIRY CO. HAS FINE BUILDING

#### Public Invited to Visit Newly Enlarged Milk Distributing Station

The photograph on our cover this week shows the newly enlarged Highland Park milk distributing station of the Bowman Dairy company.

Great has been the growth of this company's business since its beginning here seventeen years ago.

In 1913 the business was housed in a small frame building at 87 Vine avenue. Five horse-drawn vehicles were sufficient to properly serve the Bowman customers in those days, whereas today it requires fifty-two vehicles to make deliveries, most of them being large electric trucks. Eighty-five men are given steady employment in this activity and they perform their work under the most moderate and sanitary conditions. The buildings are now all of brick and fire-proof construction, occupying an area of 100x150 feet on the north-west corner of Vine avenue and Green Bay road. The buildings are finished in a subdued red brick with white stone trim and rise out of an attractive setting of close-clipped lawns, flourishing evergreens and flowering shrubs.

Smokeless and dustless oil is used for heating and the latest methods of electric refrigeration insure the low temperatures necessary to the safeguarding of the freshness, purity and flavor of Bowman Dairy products.

The Bowman Dairy company is justly proud of its participation in the growth and welfare of Highland Park and extends a cordial invitation to every resident to visit its newly enlarged home.

#### Plant in Chicago

This company is also extending invitations to its modern bottling and pasteurizing plant at 4127-55 North Kostner avenue, Chicago. Here, one may see the arrival of milk from the farms in glass-lined refrigerator cars, follow it through the interesting pasteurizing and bottling operations, and note the thorough bottle washing and careful laboratory inspections of the milk. Many parents and teachers have taken groups of children on tours of inspection through this important phase of modern milk production and declare it well worth the time.

### Highland Park Tenor One of Five Winners in Big Radio Contest

Lyman Gurney, a resident of Highland Park for many years, and a tenor who has studied voice under John Sample, a prominent instructor in Chicago, placed among the five prize winners in the Atwater-Kent Dealers' Amateur Singers contest which came to a conclusion last Saturday evening with a studio recital given by the winners over Station WIBO Chicago. Over a period of five weeks 1500 contestants were given studio hearings and 300 broadcasted in an effort to determine the best voices for the finals.

Twenty-seven singers made the finals and from these the judges picked the five whom they deemed the best.

The three judges were among the most critical musical authorities in Chicago and one of them, Dino Bigalli, assistant conductor of the Chicago Civic Opera company, directed the studio orchestra last Saturday evening when the young artists were presented to the public by name.

Not before the winners were picked did either the judges or the radio public know their identity as they were announced by numbers only.

The prizes in this contest included a cup given by Lawrence Tibbet to be presented by a representative of Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer, a weeks engagement at one of the Public theatres, a position on the staff at WIBO and other prizes such as Atwater-Kent radio sets, purses of gold, etc. The prizes are to be presented later on the stage of one of the Balaban & Katz theatres.

Mr. Gurney, who formerly for some time was a member of the choir of the Church of the Holy Spirit at Lake Forest, deserves much credit for his latest achievement which is especially noteworthy when the magnitude of the contest is considered. Mr. Gurney has been a member of the staff of the North Shore Trust Co., Highland Park, for five years.
