

Playground Summer Camp Feature, Plan of the Park Board

If you are staying in Highland Park or Ravinia the whole or part of the summer, plan on registering at the Playgrounds for the Highland Park Summer camp.

The playgrounds will be run with the program of a summer camp, with the added attraction that one may live at home.

The East Park Board has Sunset Woods, Ravinia, Lincoln and Port Clinton Playgrounds well equipped to handle games and tournaments in baseball, tennis, volleyball, archery, horseshoes and numerous other games.

The swimming program will be more extensive this year than ever. Younger children will be taught how to swim. The instructors are qualified to pass the American Red Cross life saving tests for those who qualify.

Special manual training and hand-work classes for boys and girls will be carried on at the playgrounds. Educational and pleasure hikes and trips will be taken on Wednesdays and Saturdays.

The majority of Boy Scouts will be away at the scout camp, but the playgrounds will carry on the "Cub" scout program for boys from 9 to 11 years of age.

Camp booklets will be available in the near future from the Highland Park East Park Board office in the new City hall. This booklet will give you full information of the proposed program for the summer.

The first dance of the season was held on May 30 at Sunset Wood. Owing to the coolness of the weather the attendance was light.

Dances will be held every Thursday night during the season.
