

Ft. Sheridan Troops in Military Tourney

The troops at Fort Sheridan which are to take part in the Military Tournament and Exposition to be held at Soldiers Field, Chicago, Illinois, June 21-29, will leave the fort June 17 and return June 30. During the period of the tournament the troops will be housed on the second floor of the northeast corner of the stadium. The 2nd Battalion, 2nd Infantry, from Fort Wayne, will also reach Chicago on June 17. The cavalry, artillery, 61st C.A.C. (A.A) Regiment and mounted infantry detachment of the post will march to the city while the infantry rifle companies will proceed by train. The air units from Scott and Selfridge Fields will fly to Curtiss Field, which they will make their headquarters, the same day. All exhibits will be centered on the first floor at the south of the stadium.

R. O. T. C. Camp Begins at Ft. Sheridan June 20

Fort Sheridan's Reserve Officers Training camp for members of the student bodies of various schools and colleges who have been pursuing the courses of military science and tactics at their respective schools for the purpose of obtaining commissions as reserve officers of the army of the United States, will get under way Friday, June 20, and will last until July 31. About 350 students from 19 schools, colleges, and universities will attend, of whom about 290 will be from educational institutions in the Sixth Corps area (Illinois, Michigan, and Wisconsin). The remainder will come from schools located in eight other states. For the first time in several years the R. O. T. C. college men will live in tents in the summer training camp area.

The annual Citizen's Military Training camp starts July 31 and continues until August 29.

City Paving Sheridan Place Viaduct; North Viaduct Comes Next

The city has begun paving Sheridan place under the viaduct which was recently widened under an agreement between the city and the railroad. A similar agreement was made regarding the north viaduct on Bloom street, the city to do the paving in each instance. City Clerk Musser explains that the city desires to use the large stone, left in the middle of the widened viaduct at Bloom street, in connection with the new breakwater work on the lake shore and hence there has been delay in paving there until the stone could be transferred and utilized. However, the

breakwater has reached a stage where the stone will be soon required, and the work of cleaning up and paving the north viaduct will begin in about a week or two.

Reserve Officers at Fort Sheridan June 15

The first influx of more than 700 reserve officers who will come to Fort Sheridan for their annual summer training of from two weeks to a month, will arrive Sunday, June 15. This group will consist of 45 Medical Reserve officers belonging to the 378th Medical regiment (O.R.) and to the various hospital trains of the reserve divisions. They will be followed on Tuesday, June 17, by 75 reserve sec-

ond lieutenants.

The medical group will stay two weeks and the second lieutenant group a month.

The second lieutenant group is composed of former R. O. T. C. students who have been commissioned. Their month's work will include rifle and pistol range firing and a practice march. The medical officers will perform the usual duties incident to their profession.
