## SWIMMING AT HIGH SCHOOL

## SPEND TWO DAYS AT CAMP IN WOODS

Troop 52 of Deerfield held a two day camp in a woods somewhat northeast of Deerfield Friday, May 30 till the morning of June 1.

We left Deerfield approximately at four-thirty Friday afternoon from the Presbyterian church. The camp equipment was hauled to the place in a trailer or truck cart built by Edgley Todd, and a Ford, Andrew Huhn said we could use. The truck cart made one trip, while the car made a second trip for water. When we arrived at the campsite we directly began to pitch our tents and gather firewood. When this was completed it was nearly seven-thirty p. m. and after our supper was complete and camp cleared up it was nearly dark so we played a game suitable for that time. We retired about nine-thirty and rose at 6:30 a. m., although mostly all rose and had started breakfast before that time. Mr. Russell then gave us a few setting up exercises. The boys were then allowed to eat and proceed with camp cleanup. While some cleared a trail others chopped wood, most by Tom Wood for our evening council fire. Other boys went to town to get extra equipment or grub. At 12:30 we ate dinner and then indulged in what we pleased. Some hiked, while others fished, but were unable to catch any. Mr. Zankle, the caretaker of the property, then paid us a visit and told us a great deal of interesting things. After supper was over the camp reported by patrols and it was voted that we would name the campsite Camp Oak. Milton Merner's Otter patrol then made a sign and placed it near the entrance. At eight o'clock the council fire began with the lighting ceremony. A torch shot from a nearby tree lit it. The boys sang songs and then the patrol gave three stunts, only the Pine Tree and Otter

participated. The Pine Tree gave a short drama and the Otter made the officers in charge members of the Siam club. Kenneth Vetter then told of the incidents that had happened up to the present time in camp. The officers in charge then tried to pull a stunt on the scouts but they all didn't bite. The initiation into the order of Royal Locomotive Engineers then took place. All the parents and candidate scouts thought it was very impressive. The candidates were Mr. Russell, Edgley Todd, Harry Allslow, Milton Merner, Walton Reeds, Edw. Ransdell, Edw. Wood and Charles Orsborn. The officiating members were John Ducey, Harold Huhn, Mathew and Joe Andrews, Duncan Reeds, Edw. Keubelin, Don Clark and Kenneth Vetter. The camp fire ceremony was then closed. There were a number of parents present. The scouts then all enjoyed a game of pincer and Indian. Mr. Russell's side won.
