CAMP APPLICATIONS

Now Is Time to Join; Military Training Starts Ft. Sheridan July 31

The 1930 Citizens' Military Training camp for the 6th corps area, of which Chicago is the center, will open at Fort Sheridan on July 31 and continue until August 29. This is but one of 52 camps. The camps are expected to train 40,000 boys and young men in the basic art of military discipline.

Two thousand of these will be accommodated at Fort Sheridan, 1,200 Presentation of the Class Wayne A. Thomas of them from Cook county. The Chicago and cook county quota so far shows 581 applicants, and national headquarters, which is located at 6 N. Michigan avenue, where applications may be filed, is urging those interested to file applications as soon as possible. The rest of the quota will come from northern Illinois and eastern and southern Wisconsin.


