

## CHLORINATOR FOR CARY AVENUE TANK

Installation of One as Temporary Measure Decided on at Meeting

Monday evening, June 9, a meeting was held in council chambers attended by Mayor Lewis, City Clerk Musser, members of the council, members of the North Shore Sanitary District, including President John Oliver, Attorney Beaubien, and Engineer Greeley, together with a committee and officers of the Ravinia Civic association.

The object of the meeting was to discuss ways and means for both temporary and permanent relief from the pollution of Lake water caused by the Cary avenue septic tank. The North Shore Sanitary District stated that it hoped to place before the voters within the next ninety days a general bond issue for permanent improvements all the way from Waukegan south to Cary avenue.

### Plan New Tank

There is contemplated as one of the expenditures under this bond issue the building of a new tank at Cary avenue. The North Shore Sanitary district does not have title to the property on which the tank will have to be located and the meeting expressed the hope that this situation could be ironed out by the North Shore Sanitary district and Highland Park East Park district getting together on this point.

It was decided that for temporary relief, a chlorinator would be installed ahead of the present tank. It is to be hoped that chlorination will help the conditions at the beach in Ravinia, but, of course, nothing approaching proper conditions can possibly be effected until a new tank is installed.

### Are Gratiified

Members of the Ravinia committee attending the meeting stated afterward they felt gratified that some definite action toward both temporary and permanent relief was finally being taken and that they felt that too much praise could not be bestowed upon both Mayor Lewis and the council, as well as President Oliver, Attorney Beaubien and members of the North Shore Sanitary district board for their efforts toward reaching a decision.

### City Council

The regular meeting of the city council was devoted chiefly to routine business. The Taylor avenue paving ordinance was passed, and bills and payrolls presented and approved.

## Better Films Review; Something About Work of This D.A.R. Feature

In response to inquiries about the work of the D. A. R. Better Films committee, which is being carried on all over the United States, a few facts may be of general interest. The committee came into being because of the tremendous force for good the motion picture may be, and the desire on the part of the every loyal Daughter of the Revolution to take advantage of her opportunity to help guide this great attitude-forming force, creating a demand for better pictures, and protesting against the interpolation of offensive, suggestive scenes that tend to lower the moral standards of the youth of our country.

Through the courtesy of the Motion Picture Producers and Distributors of America (who handle about 95 percent of American pictures) films are reviewed by five committee members, representing the D. A. R. five mornings a week in the projection room of the Academy of Arts and Sciences, in Hollywood. Five other national organizations send representatives also. Pictures are reviewed with regard to their suitability for family patronage, and a monthly letter is sent out to all chapters bearing suggestions, recommendations, warnings, and a list of pictures with comments thereon.

### Local Activities

The local chairman endeavors to ascertain all information possible on the pictures to be shown at the nearby theatres and present the findings of this national committee. With the great number of pictures released weekly, it is impossible to secure advice on every picture to be shown, but it is hoped that the efforts made will be found helpful, and it is in this spirit and with a desire to cooperate with the local management that they are put forth. The greatest responsibility in this matter rests with the parents, and without their intelligent interest and control, little can be accomplished.

"Such Men Are Dangerous" — This modern society drama involves a multi-millionaire who disappears from his airplane after his bride deserts him. An interesting story follows, and Warner Baxter's excellent acting makes a rather implausible story convincing. It is harmless for youths but will be beyond children under 15.
