Lone Negro with Gun Holds Up Bakers at Highwood Last Friday

Highwood police are today looking for an armed negro who held up two bakers in the back room of the Theodore Minorini bakery, at 308 Railroad avenue, at 12:45 o'clock Friday morning and escaped with \$3 in cash. They lack clues on which to work, but are looking for a strange negro who was seen about the city earlier in the evening.

The negro parked a car in front of the bakery and walked into the back room with a gun in his hand, according to the two bakers, Gideon Soderstrom and Robert Frelack, who were at work there. They heard a car stop, but did not see the man until he was in the room with them.

Menacing the couple with his pistol, he herded them behind a door, in such a position that they could not be seen from the street. He made no attempt to search them, as they were in their working clothes, but scooped up the contents of the till and drove away in his car. The cash box contained only \$3 in change, as the majority of the money had been banked earlier in the day.

The two bakers believe that they can identify the negro if he is caught.
