## Best Location for Heating Radiator Is Under Window, Report

What is the best location for the radiator in the ordinary room in a residence or apartment?

Years ago radiators were placed more or less by guess or in accordance with the wishes of the homeowner.

Today they are placed where scientific research by heating engineers has shown that they will perform their work most efficiently. This is at the source of the cold air which filters into the room. In the ordinary room this is around the windows.

The heat loss of the room is especially great around the windows not merely because windows often do not fit tight, but also because glass gives off heat to the outside air.

Very accurate data on the amount of heat which will be lost and the amount of cold air which will come in are available for the guidance of heating contractors who are members of the national association of heating contractors.

With the help of these data, the contractor knows how much heat loss the radiators must offset and then he can place his radiators where this heat loss occurs.

One of the outstanding advantages of radiator heating is that the radiators may be placed near windows. In fact, they will be most efficient at the window.
