### SOME FACTS ABOUT CAMP MAKAJAWAN

The purpose of the camp: In your scout camp your boy re-



ceives—

1. A character training founded upon his scout oath and law.
2. A program especially designed for a boy of his age and interest.
3. A recreation program that appeals and interests without overdoing.
4. A practical education in worthwhile subjects under the stimulus of the Boy Scout system of tests and merit badges.
5. An association with other boys that means clean companionship, wholesome competition, and leadership training.
6. A contact with men who are spending their time throughout the year helping boys:—Men of experience and proven moral character.
7. A training that teaches responsibility, neatness, co-operation, and obedience.
8. Prompt attention by the resident physician in case of illness and every safeguard to prevent accident. He is safer at camp than at home.
9. Constant supervision. The officers know where he is and what he is doing every minute of the time he is in camp.
10. A physical, mental, and moral development in keeping with his scout Oath and law.

### WATER CRAFT MEETS ARE CAMP FEATURE

Each camp period at least two watercraft meets are held so arranged that every one takes some part. One meet is a swimming meet in which teams and individual contests for camp records in many standard and novelty events. The canoeing and boating meets afford real competition and fun in various races and stunts. The famous "Across the Lake Hay Relay" is a part of this meet. At

the left you will see a picture of the 1929 Camp Champion (team on the right) in the glorious canoe filling contest.

This year will bring many new events in the various watercraft activities and the most outstanding will be the Sea Scout Sailing Race and Regatta. Canoe trips and boating expeditions are planned to furnish some real adventure.

### CANOEING AND BOATING CAMP AMUSEMENTS

After you have passed your canoeing or boating test—then comes the fun! The boating test is fairly easy, and you'll have the use of the boats almost at once. Canoeing isn't so simple and you'll need more instruction. Safety always!

Camp Makajawan is equipped with the finest boating equipments. Besides the Sea Scouts' two new sail boats, there are six 15-foot 36 inches wide, 50-pound canoes, one sailing canoe, two heavier 18-foot canoes and eighty speedy, easy to manage, 10-ft. row boats of the latest design. Oh, what fun!

### SWIMMING PERIODS UNDER SUPERVISION

Swimming is permitted only during regular swimming periods under proper supervision. Swimming in pairs according to the "Buddy System" in restricted areas under competent life guards assures the utmost safety. There are two regular 30 minute swimming periods, at 11:15 in the morning and at 4:30 in the afternoon. Older scouts specializing in aquatic work have classes outside the regular periods.



### RELIGIOUS FEATURES: A SCOUT IS REVERENT

The twelfth part of the scout law is "A Scout Is Reverent." Opportunity is given the scout to exercise his religious obligations in his own way. A non-sectarian service is held every Sunday morning. Catholic scouts are taken to mass in town and special classes are arranged for the Jewish and Christian Science scouts.

Life out of doors, close to the beauty and wonders of nature, teaches a scout an appreciation of God he can get in no other way. The objectives of scouting are "character building and citizenship training." The scout law is the law of the camp.

### SCOUTS ELECTED TO ORDER OF THE ARROW

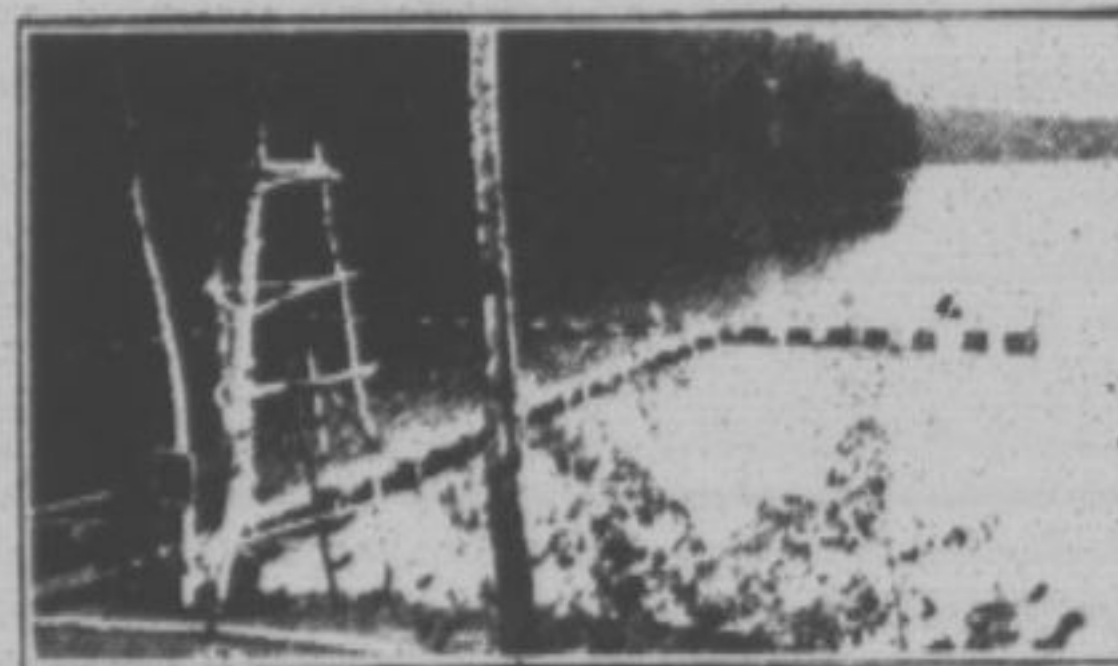
From among the scouts in camp,
