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NEW BUILDING FOR NORTH SHORE TRUST

Present Structure to Be Extensively Remodelled; Three Stories, Plan

Extensive remodeling of the North Shore Trust Co. building, corner of Sheridan road and Central avenue, which will include increase of the height to three stories throughout and entire new exterior in architectural style known as modern French, is being planned by the bank officials, and an idea of how the structure will look when finished is given in the picture from the architect's sketch on the cover page of this issue of the Press. W. D. Mann of Highland Park and Chicago is the architect.

The entire building will be raised to three stories by the addition of one story on the present two-story section facing Central avenue and two stories on the one-story north portion of the present building.

Exterior Finish

The exterior of the first story will be finished in black and green marble, and the remainder of the building in Bedford stone, with a mansard roof of slate and tile, making one of the handsomest business structures on the North Shore, it is expected.

The interior of the bank proper will remain practically as at present

Sunset Valley, which is one of the best community courses in the country, is being kept in trim for the event, and the new greens of the sixth and eighth holes will be ready for use by then. The tricky seventh hole will offer some difficulties to the golfers. The length of the hole has been increased to 420 yards, 135 yards more than before. A drainage ditch crosses the fairway diagonally for a distance of 100 yards.

A booklet describing the event will be issued later on, and will contain matters of interest to all those who make use of the club.

Further Census Report For Highland Park Is Promised; Aid Is Asked

Secretary Belmont of the Chamber of Commerce reports that following the protest of the Chamber at the low figures of the census report for Highland Park, published last week, a communication has been received from Mrs. Estelle Northam, supervisor of census for this district, pointing out that the figures released last week comprised only the first preliminary report, and that when all enumerators' reports have been revised, it is believed that the result will be altered somewhat.

The census director again urges that everybody in Highland Park who has not been counted notify her at her office in the Nichols school at Evanston, by mail or otherwise. The Chamber of Commerce will receive such notices and forward them, Secretary Belmont states, in order to facilitate speedy report. He says that the Chamber has reliable figures to indicate that Highland Park has at least 13,500 population, and it is hoped that the census figures will be amended upward when the final report is issued.

Zoning Board Refuses Permit for New Hotel; Court Fight Looming

Mrs. May McCrystle, who last Thursday was refused permission by Highland Park zoning board to erect a 75-room hotel building on a lot east of the Aleyon theatre, plans to carry the action to the highest courts, according to her attorneys.

A permit was refused by the Highland Park building department for the construction of the hotel because it would cover land zoned for residential purposes. Mrs. McCrystle contends that the land is suitable for business purposes only.
