

DEERFIELD-SHIELDS STANDING IN LEAGUE

Two Firsts and Two Seconds for Its Teams in Suburban Group; Features

J. Aldred Peel, athletic director of Deerfield-Shields high school under whose coaching the school's teams this season have won high rank in Suburban league.

The accompanying report of the standing of all teams in the High School Suburban league shows that Deerfield-Shields high school ranked first in baseball and golf and second in football (heavies) and tennis doubles. In basketball the Deerfield-Shields heavies were fourth and the Eights also fourth; in tennis singles Deerfield was fourth; in swimming the Deerfield senior team was fifth and the juniors fourth; in lightweight football the local high school was sixth, and in track, fifth. Six schools are listed in the report of the league standings.

The Deerfield-Shields golf team also won the state championship for high schools at the University of Illinois tournament and placed second in individual honors, losing by one stroke. Individual honors in the district meet held at Arlington heights was won by Robert Saielli of the local school.

All of this is a matter of gratification to the members of the team and to Coach J. A. Peel, to whose un-

The Community Vacation Church school held in the parish house of the Presbyterian church for the children in the community, from three to fourteen years of age, opened on Monday morning at nine o'clock. There were sixty-nine children enrolled on Monday and on Tuesday the enrollment reached eighty-four, and they are such a happy group of children. In the kindergarten there are 33 children, in the Primary there are 23, in the Junior are 19, and in the Intermediate are 9 children.

The instruction is graded and centered in principles of Christian living. This is a little community training in religious education. The teachers are trained and aside from the department principals previously announced the following persons are helping: Alma Rose Roth, Betty Ann Shepherd, Madge Hawkins, Frances Jenkins, Florence Watkins and Mary Belfield, Grace Gatewood and Elizabeth Morris will come into the work when they return from their vacations.

The department principals are: Miss Annie L. Cobb, kindergarten; Miss Ruth Hardiman, primary; Miss Greenlaw, junior and director of the school, and Rev. F. W. Fischer, intermediate. Miss Louise Smith has charge of the music and Willard Ericson has charge of the older boys' handcraft and the out-of-door activities.

Friday morning there will be a special program at eleven o'clock for the children and their parents. Each Friday the paper, "Vacation Echoes," published by the children of the school, will appear.

If you have not enrolled your child, you may do so by bringing him to the parish house. There is a small enrollment fee.
