

Annual "Heart Tag Day" To Be Conducted June 21

Permission has been given to the Volunteers of America to hold their ninth annual "Heart Tag Day" in Highland Park on Saturday, June 21.

The organization will be sponsored by Mrs. W. A. Alexander, Mrs. Bruce Chandler, Mrs. E. R. Phelps, Rev. C. Keller, Mrs. J. B. Garnett, Mrs. W. P. Shipnes with Miss Helen Boyce in charge of finances and Young People's work. Headquarters will be in the Y. W. C. A.

The Volunteers of America is perhaps foremost in the nation in its work in the prisons of the United States. Its Hope halls, where discharged or paroled men may stay from one day to two weeks while seeking work. Also for the state-wide work it does in looking after destitute families of men in prison.

Military Tournament at Soldier Field to Open Saturday Night

Chicago is to witness the finest demonstration of national defense ever seen in the country, when the military tournament and exposition opens at Soldier Field, Saturday evening, June 21st, and continuing until June 29th, according to Brig. Gen. C. H. Conrad, Jr., commanding Fort Sheridan, and in direct charge of the program.

The military maneuvers, which will include every branch of service in the Sixth Corps Area, infantry, cavalry, artillery, signal corps, air service, tanks, marines and a detachment from Great Lakes as well, will be one of the finest type in educating the public to its national defense as well as provide a program of entertainment, stated Gen. Conrad.

"We are confident that the people of the mid-west will see a wonderful program," said Gen. Conrad today in announcing the schedule of events. "The troops have been well rehearsed and everything is going to go off without a hitch.

"The program will open at 7:45 every evening with an air performance and at eight o'clock sharp there will be the grand review of all units that take part in the performance. Twenty-one acts have been arranged,

which not only include the military maneuvers and tactics of all branches, but there will be spectacular riding by the cavalry, charges, rough riding and Roman riding and then the program of the famous Olympic high hurdle jumpers, under the direction of Maj. Chamberlain. This team has won scores of trophies throughout the world for their work and they are a notable feature of our program.
